DUST MCCARTHY FROM LEAGUE

Board of Arbitration Declares Williams Only Elected President

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—The board of arbitration of the National Association of Professional Baseball Clubs declared that Harry A. Williams was the only elected president of the Pacific Coast League and that J. Cal Ewing is entitled to vote as the representative of the Pacific Coast League in the national association.

Secretary John J. Farrell issued the following statement in support of the board's action:

"The parties to this matter have been attentively heard. Eminent counsel have presented arguments. The mass of evidence submitted has been carefully examined and considered. The board unanimously finds that in the original transaction in which William Wrigley, Jr., induced the note of his employee, Charles L. Lockhart, to furnish the \$125,000 to purchase the controlling interest in the Seattle franchise and in the failure to disclose the existence of said note and in the later substitution of a new note for such original note, on which second note Wrigley's name did not appear, said William Wrigley, Jr., Wade Kilfoer and Charles L. Lockhart were guilty of indistinct and censurable conduct.

Three Censured
"The board therefore, does hereby censure the conduct of said Wrigley, Kilfoer and Lockhart. We find that Attorney John L. Sullivan was guilty of no improper conduct in connection with said matter.

"The board finds under the proof that Harry Williams is the only elected and constituted president of the Pacific Coast League.

"The board finds under proof that J. Cal Ewing is entitled to vote as the representative of the Pacific Coast League in the meeting of the National Association."

President Williams issued the following statement:
"Naturally I am pleased, but I am particularly happy on account of my friends and supporters. This included baseball writers from coast to coast, club owners, managers and players in every league. It was during my two day's wait for this decision that I learned of the extent of this support. During this time hundreds of men identified with baseball, many of whom I never had met before, came to me and expressed the hope that I would win, and assured me of their cooperation.

Asks Cooperation
"I had thought all along that the board, a body representing a great sport, would recognize a vote of five to three. Personally I did not appear before the board, nor have I ever met a member of it. I wanted them to judge my case solely on its merits.

"While the business of the entire convention in certain matters, particularly trades between majors and minors, was held up pending the settlement, it perhaps was best that the case was not settled hastily."

PRESERVE GAME TO BE AIM OF IDAHO GAME DEPARTMENT

Will Life be Saved From Ravages of Predatory Animals in Winter Months

BOISE, Idaho, Dec. 13.—Every effort will be made this winter by the Idaho game department to preserve game from both starvation and the ravages of predatory animals, according to announcement by R. B. Thomas, state game warden.

Arrangements have been made with the United States forest officials for their co-operation with the state department and many tons of hay will be distributed by forest rangers, it was said. Practically all parts of the state will be affected by the decision.

Trappers have been outfitted and sent into those sections where deer are known to winter, and an intensive campaign will be made against the cougar and coyote.

START BASKETBALL PRACTICE AT ORE. WITH 7 LETTERMEN

Prospects Loom Bright This Year; Veterans Expected to Develop Fast Team

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 13.—Basketball prospects at the University of Oregon loom bright this year with seven lettermen in school, and an intensive practice schedule has swung underway.

The seven veterans are Bohler-trained men and this year they are expected to develop into a formidable machine. George Bohler, who resigned as coach last year, spent two years in training this squad, and his system is believed to be very effective. This year William Rinehart, who learned the rudiments of the game in 1920 under Bohler, will coach, and he is expected to follow out the general program. Hugh Latham, '24, of Silverton, Oregon, is the only member of the famous 1920 squad left, and he is expected to be a great help in organizing the five this season. He was the unanimous choice of all critics for the all-coast position of center.

Oregon faces a hard 13-game schedule this year, of which six will be played in Eugene. The complete schedule for the season is as follows: February 4 and 5, Washington at Eugene; February 8 and 9, O. A. C. at Eugene; February 13, Idaho at Moscow; February 16, Whitman at Walla Walla, and the 22d, Whitman at Eugene; February 23, Idaho at Eugene; February 25 and 26, Washington at Seattle, and February 28 and March 1, O. A. C. at Corvallis.

In addition to this schedule, Coach Rinehart will take his squad on a "barnstorming" tour during the Christmas holidays and they will also tangle with several amateur teams in different sections of the state. This will give the men some valuable experience, and also give the coach a chance to get a line on the ability of his men, it was reported.

OREGON TO LOSE MANY STAR PLAYERS

Quarterback And East Backs Leave School This Year; Material to be Sought From Freshmen

EUGENE, Ore., Dec. 13.—The University of Oregon this year will lose several football men whose places it will be hard to fill. Chapman, quarterback; Latham, fullback; Von der Ahe, tackle, and Sax, halfback, have played their last games for the Lemon and Yellow.

There are several good men on this year's freshman team and it is believed by the assistant coaches who had charge of the yearling squad this season that some of them will make first-class varsity material. With holdover lettermen and the first year string of this season Oregon has bright prospects for a fast team next year, according to football enthusiasts.

PROPOSE DRASTIC CHANGES IN DEER AND BIRD SEASONS

Heavy Inroads on Game by Cougars And Bears Cause Commission to Consider Change

NEW PORT, Wash., Dec. 13.—Drastic changes in the lengths of both the deer and bird hunting season will be put into effect next year in Pend Oreille county as the result of a recent decision of the local county game commission. It was reported that the deer season would probably be cut in half, opening at a time, which in the past, would have been about the middle of the season.

This policy was adopted, it was said, partly because of the heavy inroads made on game recently by cougars and coyotes, reports of which have been received, and indicate that the depredations are the worst in the history of the county for this time of the year. It is planned to have both local and outside hunters at work this winter in an effort to rid the woods of cougars.

Another decision made by the commission was the outlawing of all deer hunting next season with the aid of dogs. This action was taken owing to an over-indulgence of the sport this year, it was stated. Lake Sullivan will be stocked heavily with cut-throat trout and head lake with mackinaw, in addition to the regular program of stocking the lakes and streams of the county.

POST SEASON GAMES GIVEN CONFERENCE O.K. AT BERKELEY

Predicted Controversy Falls to Materialize as College Representatives Gather

SAN FRANCISCO, Dec. 13.—The predicted controversy over post-season football games failed to materialize at the annual meeting of the Pacific Coast Intercollegiate conference, according to delegates who have just concluded an executive session at Berkeley.

The general opinion was, members said, that there would be no objection to post-season games provided them.

Leslie Henry, of the management for the Tournament of Roses in Pasadena, whose East-West game has been an annual feature for some years, assured the conference that any of its colleges playing that would be allowed to take charge of the arrangements.

It had been reported that the University of Nevada, and possibly Gonzaga university, would apply for admission to the conference, but the only application received was from the University of Montana, which was granted. With Montana added, the conference now includes nine universities, the others being the University of Washington, Washington State college, the University of Oregon, Oregon Aggies, Stanford, University of California, University of Southern California and the University of Idaho.

The conference adopted one rule designed to prohibit the proselytizing of high school football stars. This provides that no player pledged to a college fraternity while he is still in high school will be eligible for a college team.

PREPARING FOR OLYMPIC GAMES

French Have Little Hope of Winning But Would Save Prestige

PARIS, Dec. 13.—The French Olympic committee, directors of the sporting federations, clubs and close followers of athletics in France in general are bending every effort toward making a creditable showing at the 1924 Olympic games but are under no misapprehension as to the prospects of French athletes winning the games. While not unduly pessimistic they readily admit that France will not finish first, but find solace in the thought that the Olympic games are the greatest manifestation of international sports in existence and that the vanquished do not necessarily emerge from them with a loss of prestige.

"While we would much rather win the Olympic games than finish among the also rans," said Frantz Reichel, general secretary of the French committee, "we feel that great benefit will be derived for athletics in France by the mere presence and participation in all branches of sport of the 4,000 or 5,000 athletes—the best in their lines of endeavor in 52 countries. There is one thing, however, that we may win and that is the acknowledgment of all interested that the 1924 Olympic games were the best organized since their revival. This we will try to do."

In the winter sports which are to be held at Chamonix from January 29 to February 5, the opinion was general that France would only place behind the Canadians, Scandinavians and Americans in hockey, skiing, bobsleigh and curling. They are outclassed in speed skating and only hold out the hope of getting points in the figure skating where Mademoiselle Yvonne Bourgeois, who incidentally is one of France's upper ten rackets in women tennis, has more than an even chance of winning.

French rugby experts were sanguine that the team representing France in this event had a very good chance of winning, especially if Great Britain maintains her present decision of not being represented.

In association football every one admitted that France stood no show. England stands alone in this sport and the French team has been regularly defeated by the Belgians and Czechs, while the teams representing Italy, the Scandinavian countries and Spain have won more matches from France than they have lost to them in the international clashes of the past few years.

With the advent of polo in June, teams from the United States, England and even South Americans are regarded here as likely finalists as France has no combination which can place any of the foregoing in danger.

In track and field events, the winning of which was conceded by all to be the real aim of all countries entering the Olympic games, France is not expected to total up many points.

PREMIER SECOND BASEMAN OFFERED FOR SALE OR TRADE

Chance Springs Surprise With Announcement at Baseball Meet in Chicago

CHICAGO, Dec. 13.—Eddie Collins, premier second baseman of the American league and captain of the White Sox, is for sale or trade and may become manager of the Washington club for the 1924 season.

Frank Chance, newly appointed manager of the White Sox, announced that Collins had been cast into the player market. This announcement was the most important to come from the convention of more than 12,000 baseball leaders who assembled here today to set their house in order for the 1924 season.

Clark Griffith, president of the Washington club, while not denying that he had not talked over the prospects of landing Collins, intimated that he was in a receptive mood. He declined to make a flat statement saying "I can't say a thing now."

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
