

FOX ON 3 DAY DRUNK, CHARGE

Allegation Made by Prosecution as Character Witness Testifies

ATLANTA, Ga., Dec. 14.—Philip E. Fox, on trial for murder, was on a three-day drunk prior to the shooting and killing of William S. Coburn, the prosecution charged today while Congressman Summers, 5th Texas district, testified today to Fox's character.

Solicitor-General Boykin asked if the congressman knew Fox was arrested in a local hospital in this condition and in company with a woman and threatened the life of the arresting officer. The congressman said he knew nothing of Fox's life since coming to Atlanta, but during his residence in Texas his character was good.

SINNOTT GIVEN HIGHWAY POST

Oregon Representative on Committee to Aid Road Building

WASHINGTON, D. C., Dec. 14.—Western members of congress, at a meeting to consider the question of aiding some of the mountain states in the construction of coast to coast roads, appointed a committee composed of members from each of the public land states to confer with Thomas H. MacDonald, chief of the bureau of roads.

Representative Sinnott was named as member from Oregon.

This committee will consider the form of legislation to be proposed, sentiment prepping to favor construction of three through highways in the states of Montana, Nevada, Utah, New Mexico and Arizona by

federal funds without requirement for state contribution. Judge William Duby, state highway commissioner of Oregon, was in attendance at the meeting.

FILIPINOS EFFICIENT IN ENGLISH

MANILA, Dec. 14.—A total of 534 candidates recently took the bar examination tests in this city, and more than 270 asked that the examinations be given them in the English language. This is the highest English percentage ever recorded.

Only 196 candidates passed the tests.

VIENNA PUBLISHERS SEEK RELIEF

VIENNA, Dec. 14.—Publishers of Vienna newspapers have appealed to the government for relief from the paper trust. They declare they are paying 50 per cent more than before the war for newsprint, which with the cost of labor places them in a precarious position.

HOW THICK IS 1-INCH BOARD?

Question May Block Nation Wide Movement for Lumber Standardization

MADISON, Wis., Dec. 14.—Disagreement over a thirty-second part of an inch in the thickness of an ordinary board is the obstacle that may block a nation-wide movement to bring lumber standardization with a resultant saving of nearly \$250,000,000 annually to the American home building public, according to C. P. Winslow, director of the United States forest products laboratory here.

The question "how thick is an inch board?" will be discussed at a meeting of lumber producers, retail dealers and consumers in Washington for the purpose of arriving at permanent American lumber standards, Winslow said. If an agree-

ment as to thickness is reached, he declared, then standardization becomes an actuality; if not, the movement, in his opinion, may die.

Director Winslow said that the need for standardization of lumber grades is shown by the fact that the same kind of pine is now sold at various prices under thirty different grades.
