SCHNEIDAU ASKS GO WITH BURKE

FARMER FAVORED IN RITCHIE GO

Local Man Challenged For
Winner-Take-All Match
At 170 Pounds

Veteran Believed to Have
Edge But Ritchie May
Spring Surprise

Gust Schneidau, who refereed the Burke-Thye wrestling match Monday night, in a letter to The Herald challenges Burke for a winner-take-all match. He says:

"Last summer I wrestled Henry Burke, I beat him twice in less than one hour. Next match he asked me to make weight for him, 166 pounds, my weight being 175. I did make 166 and lost. It was too much weight to take off without training. I am now fixed so that I can take off weight by training. I will make 170 pounds for Burke but I will not take him on under that weight. I want to meet Burke, winner take all. He got some of my money last summer and I want to get it back.

"I have tried a number of times lately to get a match with Burke, but I never heard from him. So I came over Monday evening."

Burke said he was perfectly willing to meet Schneidau if the latter will make 170 pounds. He admits that Schneidau won from him in Lakeview but declares that he has beaten Schneidau twice, once in Lakeview and once in Klamath Falls. When Schneidau beat him in Lakeview, Burke had just gotten off the stage and had been given no time to rest up after the long ride, he said.

Schneidau said he was to meet Mike Yokel, world's light-heavyweight champion, in Medford, Friday night. Yokel was to meet Thye in Portland tonight and it is supposed he had arranged a match with Schneidau as a stopover on his way home to Salt Lake, since he told Thye he expected to go home for the holidays immediately after tonight's match.

When Frank Farmer, veteran light heavyweight of the Pacific coast, and Earl Ritchie, local heavyweight champion, meet next Friday night, it is a foregone conclusion among ringsters that somebody is going to drop, and drop hard, between the first and the tenth. Who that will be is conjecture, but general opinion seems to favor Farmer, who defeated Ritchie in their previous match here.

There is one of the most picturesque figures of the boxing world in the United States. While he has passed the age when he could be considered as championship caliber, he is regarded as the stiffest test an aspiring young boxer could encounter. Dozens of young boxers in the northwest have risen like a meteor only to meet Farmer and he bowled over. The boxing commissions on the coast keep a weather eye on all young middleweights and light-heavyweights. After they have a string of knockouts they are notified that the acid test is to be given and are matched with Farmer. If they manage to beat Farmer they may be of championship caliber, but those who have beaten him can be counted on the fingers of one hand.

Two recent examples of the foregoing are the defeats of Nig Yeager and Bob Getz at the hands of the old veteran.

Yeager, a light-heavyweight with an anaesthetizing punch in either hand, piled up a formidable record of victories over the "knockout" route. He was undoubtedly the biggest drawing card in Portland because every time he stepped into the ring somebody was bound to take a nose dive to the canvas. When he was matched with Farmer, the sport writers said, "Poor old Frank, his time has come."

Poor old Frank stepped in and out of Yeager's sledge hammer blows.

and made a monkey of him. When ever Yeager connected Farmer was moving away and the blows had no force. He won the decision so decisively that the judges voted unanimously.

Bob Getz was another boxer with an enviable record and a likely future. He was matched with Farmer and after receiving a terrific beating was knocked out cold as a shark's eye in the sixth round.

Ritchie is one of the prettiest boxers in Oregon. Beautifully built and possessed of a natural boxing instinct, he is able to slip one over on Farmer that will open the eyes of sportsmen. The last time he boxed Frank he was knocked out. If he has innate fighting blood he will have profited by his experience and will be better able to combat Farmer.

But if he is a fair weather boxer Farmer will slip under one of his leads and knock him out in the first or second round.

Two preliminaries that promise to be slashing affairs will precede the main event. Jim Stevenson of Merrill and Billy Huff of Chico, both middleweights, will feature in the semi-windup. Both boxers are well known here and will undoubtedly make a good match.

The first bout of the evening will be between Sid Herbert and Harrington, a four-round affair.
