

COUNTY GETS 70 DAIRY CALVES

Forty of Shipment From Tillamook Went to Boys and Girls

Thirty high-grade dairy heifer calves were shipped into Klamath county from Tillamook county during the spring months of 1933, for the boys' and girls' club work. Seventy of the Tillamook calves were shipped into Klamath county in 1934.

Every one of these calves was from a dam with a record of over 300 pounds of butter fat production per year.

Forty of these calves were ordered by the county agricultural agent and the county club leader for boys' and girls' club work in 1933 and were shown at the county fair in October.

The boys and girls cared for and fed their calves according to instructions from the extension division of Oregon Agricultural college.

Several of the heifers which were shipped into the county in 1922 have freshened and growing into excellent dairy cows.

Since the dairy cows of Klamath county have an average production of only 125 pounds of butter fat per year, one can readily see that heifers from high-producing cows are going to be a big factor in the development of the dairy business in Klamath county and put dairying on a paying basis.

Too many dairymen go into the business with cows that do not return a profit and consequently in a year or two the cows are disposed of and the business is condemned.

There is no money in keeping boards that do not pay their board. Tillamook county dairymen have become prosperous by milking good cows and we know that Klamath county has a decided advantage over Tillamook by having an abundance of first-class alfalfa, hay and grain, plenty of pure water and an ideal climate for the dairy cow.

We also know that the ranchers of Klamath county who have been milking a few good cows find dairying profitable.

Dairying in Klamath county is not an experiment any more.

When calves are ordered from the famous, Tillamook county dairy herds that have been bred for heavy production for several years, there is very little chance of raising an unprofitable cow.

E. M. Bubb of the American National bank, is showing his interest in the development of dairying in Klamath county by loaning money to the boys and girls for the purchase of Tillamook calves. The loan is made for one year at the rate of 6 per cent.

QUAKE DESTROYS TOWNS

NOGALES, Dec. 21.—Destruction of three towns, near Sierra Madre in Sonora, by an earthquake, was confirmed in reports today. Several hundred casualties were reported.

CHRISTMAS APPEAL FOR RELEASE OF IRISH PRISONERS

Cardinal Would Empty Prisons to Save From Death Those on Hunger Strike

BELFAST, Dec. 21.—Unhappily Ireland is threatened with another Christmas lacking the peace, goodwill, unity and charity which should be the leading features of the Feast of the Nativity, says a message of Cardinal Logue to be read in all the Catholic churches of his archdiocese. His eminence said that were it at his disposal he should have the prisons emptied and the concentration camps deserted before Christmas. He appealed to the government of the Free State to clear its prison camps as quickly as it could, retaining only those convicted of crime or liable for trial.

Noting that a large number of prisoners had entered on a hunger strike to force their release, and that many still persisted in denying themselves food, the cardinal said this was his chief anxiety.

"It appears to me foolish, ineffective and of very doubtful morality," said his message. "I know hunger strikers do not intend their own death but they are risking it. I would earnestly appeal to them to abandon this dangerous and unlawful expedient."

RUMOR OF DEMANDS ON ROUMANIA ARE CAUSE OF SENSATION

BUCHAREST, Dec. 21.—A lively sensation has been created in the Routhanian capital by the publication in Belgrade Tribune of an article outlining new territorial demands to be made on Roumania.

The Tribune, which is regarded as the personal organ of Premier Pashitch, points out that the war efforts of Jugoslavia have been inadequately rewarded in the distribution of territory as between Jugoslavia and Roumania.

It is pointed out in the article that Roumania must cede to Jugoslavia additional territory down to the Teberna River.

Governmental circles here view this declaration with undisguised uneasiness.

LIQUOR BUSINESS IN GERMANY DULL AS TRAVEL WANES

HAMBURG, Dec. 21.—Train travel in Germany during the coming winter is not promising of either comfort or dependability. There are not so many fast trains as formerly between the big cities; there have been sent out from this city last August

other cut-throats, and there are fewer sleeping cars.

Outside the great cities the hotel accommodations also are far below those of normal times. There is little motor touring, and few foreign tourists are visiting the romantic places of interest. Consequently hotels which once were acceptable are now very unsatisfactory.

The liquor business, which was once the mainstay of many inns, has declined so greatly that bars are practically closed. Many inns in the small towns are even short of bread, and innkeepers share the general demoralization and disorganization which has spread throughout the economic and social fabric.

VIENNA THEATRY EXAGGERATED

VIENNA, Dec. 21.—Theatry in Vienna was not as prevalent during the first five months of this year as was made to appear in a story

in which erroneous figures have been used, created a wrong impression.

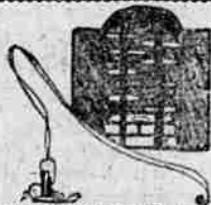

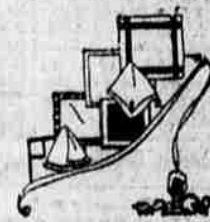
