FIND FOSSILS OF ANCIENT FLOWERS IN SOUTH DAKOTA

CHICAGO, Jan. 18.—Traces of flowers that may have bloomed millions of years ago have been discovered in the petrified forest of the Southern Black Hills in South Dakota, according to D. C. Davies, director of the Field Museum of Natural History. The age of the formation in which they are found, as estimated on the basis of active disintegration, exceeds a hundred million years.

One of these flowers has been reconstructed here in the museum in co-operation with their discoverer, Professor Wieland of Yale, an authority on these plants.

"These flowers belong to an extinct group of 'non-flowering' plants an apparent contradiction in terms," said Davies. "Their nearest living relation are the so-called sagopalm, the plants that furnish

the 'palm leaves' used by florists. The sagopalm or Cycads are flowerless plants in the same sense as pine trees are flowerless. They are extinct relatives, however, not perfect flowers in great number, large, very elaborate and striking, unlike any other flowers known. So abundant were these plants in the time that the era when they flourished is called the Age of Cycads. "This flower greeted the eyes of its antediluvian contemporaries, the long-necked Brontosaurus and the horned Triceratops, both of them and all their kind, according to geological science, turned to dust or stone long before Noah gathered his zoo for the ark."

U. S. PREVENTS FREE GRAZING

Siskiyou Ranchers Who Refused to Get Permits Are Entitled

YREKA, Cal., Jan. 18.—The order of United States Attorney-General Dougherty a few months ago to speed up injunctive proceedings against ranchers turning stock onto the national forest ranges without grazing permits was felt here for the first time this week when federal documents were served on N. E. Lange of Walker and Henry J. Lange, Julius Lange and Martin C. Lange of Yreka. Inquiry at the Klamath forest service office here revealed that action against N. E. Lange grew out of his alleged refusal to take out a grazing permit, while in the case of the others it is alleged they turned stock on the range after grazing permits had been denied.

The action of the United States government places the Langes in a position where they will be subject to arrest for contempt if the restraining order is not implicitly obeyed. According to forest officials there is room for additional stock in the region grazed over by N. E. Lange, but that at the time Henry, Julius and Martin Lange applied for grazing privileges the area's quota had been filled to its capacity.

The action against the Langes will be of interest throughout this part of the state, as it is stated there have been many infractions of the federal rules regarding trespassing on grazing lands.

The Langes are among the most prominent stockmen and successful ranchers on the Klamath river, and for many years have followed the industry.

The ranging area affected by the restraining orders is in what is known locally as the Deadwood district, near Walker, on the Klamath river.

HARDING MEMORIAL DRIVE PROGRESSING

National Chairman Crissinger Advises Local Chairman Good Results are Obtained

The Warren G. Harding memorial is taking on rapid progress throughout the nation, according to a letter from D. R. Crissinger, chairman of the organization committee at Washington, D. C., to Perry O. Dolap, Klamath county chairman of the association.

De Lap is mailing letters today to the community chairman, the chamber of commerce, Rotary and Kiwanis clubs asking them to get behind the national movement. Klamath county's quota is \$1000.

De Lap stated today that inasmuch as the campaign in this county did not start until January 1, it was difficult to estimate how much money had been subscribed to date. The campaign will close February 15. Those desiring to contribute may do so by sending their money to Leslie Rogers at the First National bank.

WASHINGTON, D. C., Jan. 18.—Certificates of associate membership in the Harding Memorial association are being mailed at the rate of a thousand a day from the headquarters of the organization here. Each contributor of \$1 or more to the Harding Memorial fund becomes eligible for associate membership and receives one of the handsomely engraved certificates.

As fast as the subscriptions are reported to headquarters a receipt is issued and a certificate filled out and mailed to the distributor. As yet, only scattered reports have been received and when cities and states begin sending in their final reports the workers here expect to be flooded. A careful record is being kept, however, and the certificates will be delivered as rapidly as the clerical staff can make them out.

The engraved portrait of President Harding which appears on the certificates is from Mrs. Harding's favorite photograph of the late executive. Under it is a facsimile signature of Harding. The facsimile signature of President Coolidge, honorary president of the Memorial association, also appears.
