UNITED CONFEDERATE VETERANS TO MEET

LOS ANGELES.—Veterans of the Confederate army residing in California will be organized for attendance at the annual encampment of the United Confederate Veterans at Memphis, Tenn., next June, in accordance with arrangements made by I. P. Barnard, adjutant-general of the organization.

FRESNO BEE ABSORBS HERALD BY PURCHASE

FRESNO, Cal.—The James McClatchy company, owners of the Fresno Bee, have announced the purchase of the Fresno Evening Herald, one of the pioneer newspapers of the San Joaquin valley, and representatives of the Fresno Bee took charge of the Herald this morning. The principal owner of the Fresno Bee is Charles K. McClatchy, editor of the Sacramento Bee. It was announced by the new owners of the Fresno Herald that the former Herald subscribers would be served with the Bee, effective at once, as they intend to absorb the Herald immediately. The circulation claimed by the Herald was 7916 and that of the Bee is announced as 16,600.

VILLAGE CALLED OPIUM CENTER IS DESTROYED

SANTA BARBARA, Cal.—Destroying what officers say was one of the leading opium-distributing centers in the state, flames have wiped out the oriental quarter of Guadalupe, a small town in the northern part of the county.

Santa Maria reports estimated the loss at \$75,000, but insurance men here say the shacks destroyed were almost worthless.

More than 150 Japanese and Chinese were left homeless. Local countrymen are starting a relief fund for the destitute.

The buildings were erected in 1872 and the burned settlement resembled a tumbledown '49 mining camp. The fire started in a joss house, where Chinese were burning incense to their gods.

SECOND NEWSPAPER AGENT DROPPED

ASTORIA, Ore.—An unusual coincidence occurred here in the death of W. C. MacCallum, agent for the Portland Telegram, who suffered a stroke of paralysis and died. Seventy-two hours before F. A. Thoms, agent for the Journal in Astoria, dropped dead in Bond street from heart disease.

GAMBLING BANNED IN SANTA BARBARA

SANTA BARBARA, Cal.—A general agreement has been made by representatives of churches, fraternal societies and civic organizations with the chief of police and city council to prohibit the use of the wheel of fortune and other games of chance at any of their bazaars that may in the future be held for charity or other worthy causes.
