CLAY DEPOSIT IS LIKE MEERSCHAUM

LEWISTON, Idaho, Feb. 14.—Considerable interest is being manifested over the discovery of deposits of a clay-like mineral apparently possessing nearly all of the elements composing the Asia Minor meerschaum. The deposits were located on the upper Clearwater river and Potlatch creek, near here.

Samples from the deposit brought to Lewiston have been turned into pipes, cigar and cigarette holders by Patrick Gibbons of this city and are being tested by various smokers.

According to Gibbons, the specific gravity of the substance is less than water but the color is a yellowish white instead of the bleached white of the European and Asiatic mineral.

Recent investigations indicate that there is a large supply of the substance. Gibbons said, and topographic features favor the working of the deposits.

EXTREMES OF CLIMATE FOUND IN CALIFORNIA

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 14.—California boasts about its climate. And California has lots of climate to boast about, according to the United States weather bureau here, which says California has a greater assortment of climate than any other state and more contrast.

The following official weather reports prove California can delight an Eskimo or soothe a savage from darkest Africa.

The hottest temperature ever recorded in the world was in Death Valley, July 10, 1913, when the mercury rose to 134 degrees in the shade.

Boyle, in Mono county, holds the California record for the other extreme, with 36 degrees below zero.

While many parts of the state have never been snowed, Alpine county had a fall of 73 feet in the winter of 1906-07.

Del Norte county registered 152 1/2 inches of rainfall in a single year. Lake county had 71.54 inches fall in a single month.

In San Bernardino county it rained 16.71 inches in a single day. In the same county there is a section where not a drop of rain has fallen for more than two years.

Point Reyes, on the California coast, has the coolest summer in America with a mean temperature of 54 degrees.

In some sections of California, high in her great mountains, frost can be found every month in the year. Other sections never have fro-

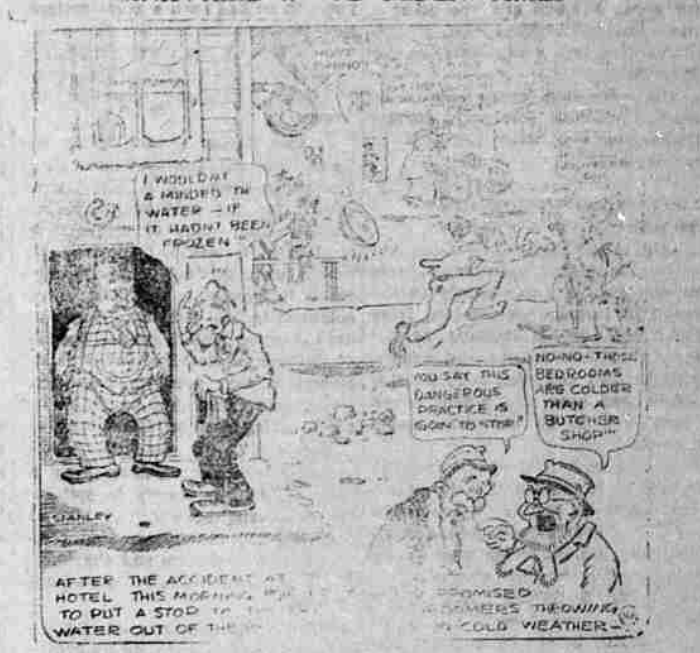
