

ROTARIANS OF NORTHWEST TO MEET IN APRIL

SPokane, Wash., March 21.—More than 1,500 Rotarians are expected to attend the eleventh annual conference of the first Rotary International district, which will be held here for three days, April 13, 14 and 15, next. The district embraces the states of Washington, Oregon, Northern Idaho and British Columbia.

Business sessions, interspersed with numerous special entertainment features, will occupy the attention of delegates during the first two days.

Addresses by prominent Rotarians, including Miles M. Hiley, governor of the first district, and Estes Shebecor of Portland, Or., past international president, have been scheduled. Dr. Charles F. Elkenshary, president of the Spokane Rotary club, will give the address of welcome.

Henry Suzuki, president of the University of Washington, will speak on "Fellowship as the Basis of International Cooperation." Dr. A. H. Upham, president of the University of Idaho, will also deliver an address.

Will Shelly of Vancouver, B. C., will talk on the "Employer's Relation to the Employee."

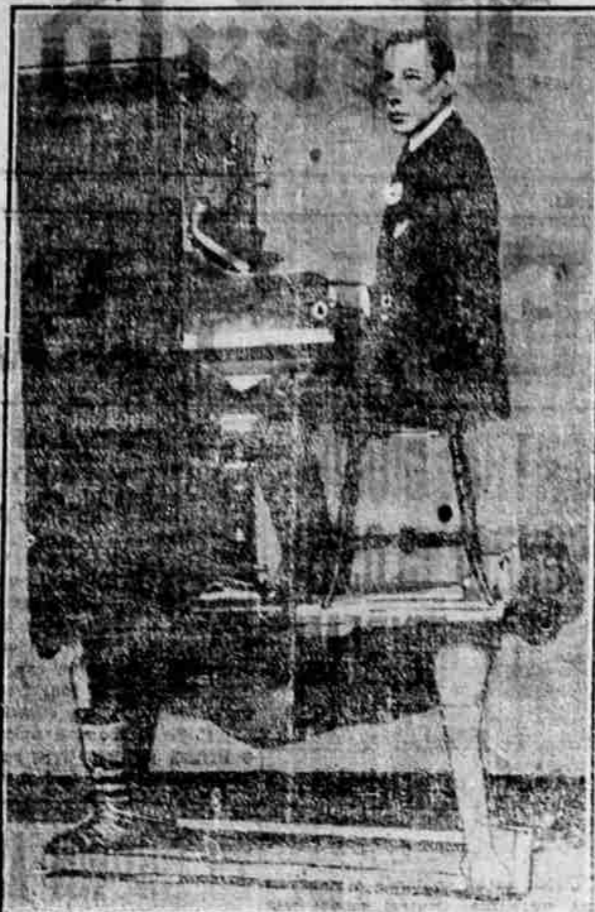

WILSON, CONGO TO BE TRIED MONDAY ON LIQUOR CHARGE

MERFORD, March 21.—Trial of Henry S. Wilson, former chief of police of Klamath Falls, and a well known resident for years of Klamath county, I. Congo, and I. B. Hatfield, residents of the same city, charged with violation of the prohibition laws, in operation of a giant still in the Sam's Valley district, is scheduled to begin at Jacksonville next Monday. The defendants are represented by Attorney George M. Roberts of this city, and Attorney Horace Manning of Klamath Falls.

The arrests were made as a result of a raid by the sheriff's office and federal prohibition enforcement officer, Newt Chaney. A large still, three redwood tanks for holding mash, and half a dozen sacks of sugar, is a portion of the evidence collected. The outfit was said at the time to be the best and cleanest ever unearthed in this section.

SPANISH VETS ORGANIZE CAMP

Establishment of a Spanish-American war veteran camp in Klamath county was consummated last night at a meeting of the veterans in the office of A. R. Wilson. The camp is known as Herbert Applegate camp number 25 of the Oregon department. Officers were elected and meetings arranged to be held the second and fourth Thursday of each month in the county courthouse.

Officers elected were: E. C. Koppen, commander; Arthur R. Wilson, senior vice-commander; Robert Robbins, junior vice-commander; H. W. Dahlany, lieutenant; Frank Frankfort, quartermaster; A. R. Morrison, officer of the day; P. E. Aiken, officer of the guard; F. C. High, C. E. Joy and W. M. Keller, trustees.

The organization is the result of an annual banquet of the veterans held February 21, at which it was decided to organize a camp. Purpose of the organization is to perpetuate the memories of comradeship of the Spanish-American war, the Philippine insurrection, and the Chinese relief expedition, to care for those left under the care and protection of the able members of the veterans and to cherish the memory of the dead.

WOULD INCREASE STREET CAR FARES IN SALEM, EUGENE

SALEM, March 21.—An increase of street car fares from six to seven cents in Salem and Eugene is to be made effective by the Southern Pacific April 22, unless protest is made and the increased rates suspended by the public service commission. The company filed a revised schedule today.
