WOULD REDUCE AUTO LICENSE FEE ONE-FOURTH.

PORTLAND, Ore. — Efforts are under way through the leadership of W. P. Wagon, whose occupation is a filler, residing at 370 Stark street, to raise a fund to cover the expense of obtaining sufficient signatures to place on the ballot at the next general election a legislative measure to reduce automobile and motor truck license fees approximately one-fourth. Wagon refuses

to disclose the identity of the interests support him.

FIND OIL ON FARM NEAR PORTLAND.

PORTLAND, Ore. — Drilling for oil is progressing on the farm of E. P. Evans near Sycamore station, on the Portland Railway. Light & Power company's Estacada line, southwest of Gresham.

The bore, carrying a 4 1/2-inch casing, is down almost 500 feet, and two or three barrels of black oil is brought up daily, says Dr. J. B. Koefler, Portland dentist, who is interested in the project.

Operations are conducted by the Grimes Oil & Gas company, of which J. C. Grimes is president. After obtaining a lease to explore possible petroleum resources on the Evans farm last summer the company set up a derrick and started drilling.

The difficulty now is to exclude the water in the drill hole.

\$10,275 IS PAID FOR \$7500 JOB.

SEATTLE, Wash.—Dr. Edwin J. Brown, mayor of this city has gone for a vacation on his ranch at Ephrata, Wash., leaving on file official statements showing that he cost him \$10,275.44 to be re-elected a week ago for two years. The statements said that Dr. Brown spent \$2807.52 in a campaign preceding a primary election February 26, and \$7467.92 more before the final. The salary of the office is \$7500 annually.
