HONORS FOR MISS FRYE

Friends of Miss Hazel Frye, daughter of Mr. and Mrs. George S. Frye, will be pleased to hear of the many honors which have recently been bestowed upon her. Miss Frye was a graduate of the local high school in 1916 and afterward a teacher in Riverside school. She was elected into membership of the League of American Pen Women, Berkeley Branch. The League is an organization of authors, cartoonists, composers of music, dramatists, illustrators, painters, poets and sculptors of professional rank. The object of the League is to give mutual benefit to creative work of women of the pen, pencil and brush and to stimulate literary and artistic production. She is a member of the advertising staff of "The Pen, Pencil and Brush," the official publication of the league with a circulation throughout the United States, London and Paris. She is also a member of The Order of Bookfellows, an organization to foster friendship among writers and further the appreciation of a high type of literature. The official publication is known as "The Stepladder." Among her members are Hamlin Garland, Richard Le Gallienne, John Drinkwater, Irving Bacheller, Hugh Walpole and Edwin Markham. Miss Frye is teaching English and Journalism in Alameda high school, Alameda, Calif. She organized a Press club there and is to act as delegate to the California State Journalism convention of high schools at Stanford University, May 2, 3, 1934, sponsored by the Stanford Chapter of Sigma Delta Chi, national journalistic society. She was also elected president of the San Joaquin Valley association of English Teachers 1933-34. As to her own creative effort, she is editor and business manager of "The Aldebarans," the official magazine of the national society Beta Phi Alpha. She is president of the Day Section alumnus association of Beta Phi Alpha at the University of California. Miss Frye expects to spend the coming year in study and travel abroad.

Mr. and Mrs. C. D. Brown were dinner hosts on Thursday evening at their home on Eldorado street. Covers were laid for twelve guests.

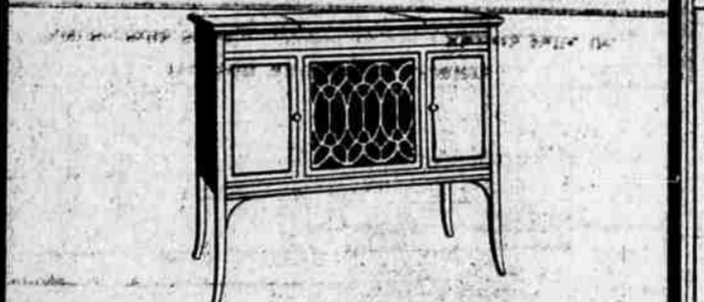
