BALLOONISTS READY FOR RACE

SAN ANTONIO, Texas, April 23.—

The seven pilots and their aides in the National Balloon Race to be held at Kelly Field in April, will be provided with letters from United States diplomatic officials to officials of the Canadian and Mexican governments that will assure them every courtesy and assistance from those countries should a landing be made outside of the United States.

Every official and balloonist is expecting a new record to be established and in order to provide for any eventually arrangements have been made with adjoining governments to co-operate in assisting the airmen to return to their home country.

Each balloonist will keep a detailed log of his journey, including also the flight and the landing. He will be furnished with blank telegraph forms which will be dropped overboard with a request that the finder send them to race headquarters.

The messages are attached to a red streamer two yards long, on back of which appear these instructions:

"To Finder: The message on the other side is from one of the balloons in the National Balloon Race which started from San Antonio, Texas, April 23. Please send it immediately so that friends of the crew may get news of their whereabouts. If the blanks have not been filled out by the pilot, please fill them out yourself, putting merely 'high' or 'low' altitude."

Another feature of the race is that the gas with which the bags are to be inflated is to be a combination of hydrogen and natural gas in definite proportions, rather than coal gas or the product of a gas plant.

The strength of the rigging of the balloon is designed to carry a maximum weight. The lift of the natural gas used to carry this maximum weight must be approximately 45 pounds per 1,000 cubic feet, officials say. As the natural gas of the San Antonio fields has a lift of only 31 pounds per 1,000 cubic feet, it is necessary to increase this lift approximately 14 pounds in order to utilize the maximum carrying capacity of the balloon. This will be done by mixing pure hydrogen which has a lift of 71 pounds per 1,000 cubic feet.
