PLAN VILLAGE FOR ATHLETES

COLOMBES, France, May 9.—The "Olympic Village" destined to house the athletes and representatives of the various nations competing in the 1924 games who may wish to avail themselves of its modest but hygienic and up-to-date accommodation, has just been completed and turned over to the French Olympic committee by the contractors.

Built about a hundred yards away from the stadium, the village is composed of a series of villas of two and four rooms each. It provides accommodation for 300 athletes. Up to the present only Japan has officially notified the committee that its entire team would stop there.

Teams of other nations, however, for which housing accommodation has been arranged elsewhere, have retained some villas where the men who are to compete on the following day will remain overnight.

Supplied with all the modern comforts, shower baths and hygienic apparatus the villas, tastefully decorated and painted in bright colors, will provide a healthful home for the athletes while presenting a picturesque and agreeable aspect.

Reading rooms, lounge and restaurant, post office and telegraph, a bank, a cafe, two barber shops, all bordering upon "Avenue Pierre de Coubertin"—the main street of the village, named after the president of the International Olympic committee—are some of the conveniences which will be placed at the disposal of the foreign athletes.

MAINE PLANS TO HONOR LUMBERJACK

BANGOR, Me., May 9.—The spirit of the old-time Maine lumberman who guided the great log jams down rushing rivers is to be perpetuated in bronze. On the base of a fountain to be erected near the Bangor public library as a memorial to the late Col. Luther H. Pierce of Chicago, a former Bangor resident, will be placed a great bronze relief depicting three river drivers engaged in the perilous task of breaking out the key log of a jam to release the millions of logs behind.
