### New York Governor Advocates That States Have Power to Legislate

NEW YORK, June 9.—Revision of the Volstead act to permit states to legalize the sale of light wines and beer is urged by Governor Alfred E. Smith in his first public statement on the subject since he became a candidate for the Democratic nomination for president. He also said he believed the Ku Klux Klan contrary to American principles.

### DOCTORS CONDEMN "FEE SPLITTING" IN ANNUAL SESSIONS

CHICAGO, June 9.—The secret division of fees by physicians, so-called "fee splitting," was condemned and recommendations made for the use of county societies in checking the practice, in the report of the judicial council of the American Medical Association, given today at the organization's convention.

Secretary Olin West reported more than 90,000 member physicians, 55,000 of whom are Fellows. He urged the carrying of post-graduate practical medical education to the individual member of the county medical society by the central organization. It also was brought out that today there is one physician for

every 724 people in the United States.

The council on medical education and hospitals indicated that the number of medical schools in the United States now represents a normal supply and is sufficient to meet the demand for physicians.

"There are now 5,830 hospitals in the United States, 940 of which use interns," the council declares. "Only

660 of these 940 hospitals using interns have been approved by the council as proper for giving intern training. Many hospitals complain of a shortage of interns, and attempt, just being made by the council, to meet the shortage by lengthening the term of the internship, and by securing more equitable distribution."

**Michigan Avenue.**

The city engineer, pursuant to Resolution of the Common Council heretofore adopted, having, under date of May 12, 1924, filed plans, specifications and estimates of the cost of improving Michigan Avenue from Main street, northwesterly to Esplanade street, including intersection at Main street and from Michigan Avenue from the southeast corner of Lot 1, Block 54, Second Hot Springs Addition, in a westerly direction to Esplanade street, as particularly laid out and described on the plan and map filed herein by the City Engineer, as aforesaid; and the Common Council having taken the same under advisement and having found the said plans, specifications and estimates satisfactory:

**THEREFORE, BE IT RESOLVED** by the Common Council, that the said plans, specifications and estimates for the improvement of Michigan Avenue from Main Street northwesterly to Esplanade street and from Michigan Avenue to Esplanade Street, as aforesaid, through Lot 1, Block 54, including intersection on Michigan Avenue at the southeast corner of Lot 1, Block 54, be and the same are hereby approved.

**AND BE IT FURTHER RESOLVED** that the Common Council hereby declares its intention to improve the said portions of Michigan Avenue and street through the said Lot 1, Block 54, in accordance with the said

plans, specifications and estimates, said improvement to consist of improving the said portions of Michigan Avenue and Lot 1, Block 54, aforesaid, with eight inch binder bound macadam, or seven inch water bound macadam, pavement or road material. 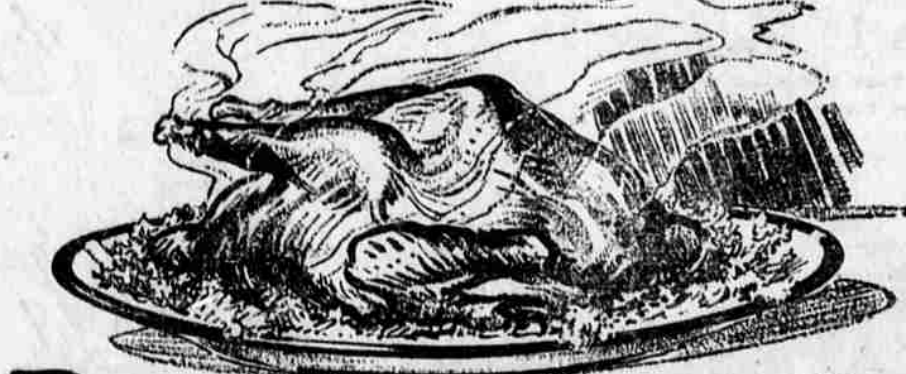
