

ABSTRACT FIRM HAS NEW OWNER

Klamath County Company Is Purchased By E. S. Veatch

In a deal consummated last night, all stock of the Klamath County Abstract company owned by Don J. Zimwalt and Mrs. Margaret James passed into the hands of E. S. Veatch, assistant cashier of the First National bank. Mr. Veatch has resigned his position at the bank which will take effect at the first of the month, and on July 1 will take over the abstract office.

"The business will be conducted in much the same way as in the past," Mr. Veatch said today. "It will be known as the Klamath County Abstract office the same name it holds now."

Mr. Veatch has for the past seven years occupied a position at the First National bank. He gained extensive experience in abstracting work in Grants Pass six years previous to his arrival here where he worked in the Josephine county clerk's office.

 "Qualitative be forgot." Delegation from every state stood on chairs and cheered for Cox.

Cox Gets Ovation.
 It was a personal tribute, unorganized and unguided, conveying the gratitude of Democracy for the aggressive fight of the former Ohio governor made in 1920. The demonstration lasted a quarter of an hour. A moment later the delegates turned to their rivalries over McAdoo and Smith, with more demonstrations and counter-demonstrations as speakers from a dozen states proceeded with a long list of seconding

speeches. While Baker was speaking he referred to the League of Nations, and the League men on the floor started a demonstration in which probably a third or fourth of the delegates rose to their feet cheering.
 NEW YORK, June 27.—The first platform plank approved by the committee scores republican "inefficiency and corruption" the second pledges agricultural relief. The law enforcement declaration specifically applies to prohibition but does not mention Eighteenth amendment or the Volstead act.
 Among other planks approved by the committee were favoring: Readjustment of the rail tariff schedule, abolition of the railroad labor board and repeal of the rate act; reduction of the transportation tax; further reduction of federal taxes; revision of the Fordney-McCumber tariff law; public control and supervision of all oil reserves; provision for drafting material re-

sources as well as man power in event of war; reduction of land and sea armaments; facilitation of steady employment of labor; independence of the Philippines; development of Muscle Shoals; Exclusion of Japanese immigrants; government operation of the merchant marine until ships can be sold to American citizens; government aid in reclamation; regulation of the anthracite industry; highway development through government aid; and amendment to federal constitution through popular referendum.
 In the afternoon convention rose cheering and several western delegations started a parade when Governor Charles W. Bryan of Nebraska, was placed in nomination. Shouts of "Hurrah for Bryan" and the band played tunes of old time days when William Jennings Bryan was a delegate from Florida, was the party's undisputed leader. The demonstration like that for Cox was manifestly another tribute to a name revered in party history rather than a manifestation of support for the man placed in nomination today. The tribute to the name of Bryan wound up with delegates singing "Onward Christian Soldiers". When order was restored, Francis Clyde Keefe, of Iowa, New Hampshire, nominated Governor Fred H. Brown, John A. Mather then nominated Governor Blaine of New Jersey. Senator Swanson nominated Carter Glass of Virginia.

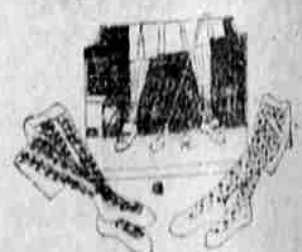
