SCOUT TROOP ACTS IN SAVING TIMBER

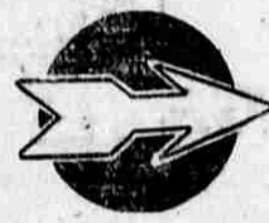
