ISLAND CONTROL TO BE SETTLED

United States and Netherlands Will Soon be on Common Ground

MANILA, Feb. 11.—Governor General Leonard Wood has made a report to Washington regarding the dispute between the United States and the Netherlands governments over the control of Las Palmas Island, one of the Philippine group about 15 miles south of Diva, province in the Celebes Sea. General Wood and Governor General D. Pock, of the Dutch East Indies, were authorized by their respective governments to reach an understanding in the matter several months ago and during an exchange of visits between the two an agreement was reached. General Wood said his report was on its way to the war department at Washington, but on account of its confidential nature he could not discuss it.

Although Las Palmas is 40 miles within the defined boundary of the Philippine group as declared by the treaty of Paris in 1899, the Netherlands flag has continued to fly over the island and the Dutch government of Java has continued to administer the affairs of the small colony of Filipinos.

FAMOUS CATHEDRAL IS NEAR COLLAPSE

ULM, Germany, Feb. 11.—The cathedral of Ulm, next to Cologne cathedral the largest Gothic house of worship in Germany, is in grave danger of collapse unless the structure can be braced and certain parts replaced. The edifice was neglected during the war, the revolution, and the period of inflation.

Ulm Cathedral, which is capable of holding 30,000 people, was carried on at intervals till the 16th century. It was by no means completed then, but for several centuries was left in its unfinished state. Work was resumed in 1846, and completed in 1890.

CHILOQUIN MILL TO USE ELECTRICITY

The machinery in the new box factory at the Chiloquin Lumber company will be driven by electric power furnished by the California Oregon Power company. It was announced yesterday.
