ANOTHER CIRCUIT JUDGE FOR THIS COUNTY IS URGED

Klamath county would have an additional circuit judge under the provisions of a bill drafted by Frank L. Mars and forwarded today to Representative Hamilton for introduction in the present legislature. Increased population which brings increased court business is given as the need for an additional jurist.

A bill also was drafted providing that all county judges shall be licensed attorneys, and that all justices of the peace in towns of 1000 population shall also be licensed attorneys. He will seek to have these bills introduced by Representative Hamilton.

AMENDMENT QUASH PLEASES NURSES

A report has been received by the graduate nurses here that the amendment to the nurses' registration bill was withdrawn by Senator Davis after a hearing was given by both sides.

The Oregon senators came into the hearing and voiced their sentiments as coming from the nurses from their home.

WILEY TELLS OF ETHICS OF LAW

Local Attorney Delivers Able Address at Kiwanis Luncheon Today

Wilson S. Wiley, prominent attorney of this city, was the chief speaker at today's meeting of the Kiwanis club. Mr. Wiley had as his topic, "Ethics of the Law" and delivered a masterful address. "Many people, contemplating the law as a life work, think of it only in the terms of big fees, glory, future political honors, etc." said Mr. Wiley. "This is a serious mistake" continued the speaker. "There is no profession today—no body of men—that is more interested in perpetuating the ideals of American government, simple justice and all of the good and noble things of life than the lawyers."

"There are black sheep in every profession, in every trade. It is the duty of such clubs as Kiwanis and Rotary to take a determined stand against sharp practices in business. We have what is known as the "shyster" lawyer. He never gets anywhere and occasionally lands in the penitentiary, or at least has the gown of his profession torn from him."

Kiwanian Judge Gashagen responded to a call for a few remarks on the life of Abraham Lincoln and delivered a short talk appropriate to the occasion. W. A. West presided. The speakers were honored by an almost one hundred per cent attendance of the club.
