AT THE LIBERTY

Many of the most dramatic sequences of "The Love Bandit," which will be shown at the Liberty theatre tonight, were made in a picturesque lumber camp in Maine. It was during the month at camp that Doris Kenyon, who portrays the heroine, Amy Van Clayton, and Cecil Spooner learned much about the lumber industry.

"It was interesting," said Miss Kenyon, "to watch the men sawing lumber for quartered oak and the pretty, gnarled and curly grains that make furniture so attractive. Quartered oak is just what the name implies. The log is first quartered and then the planks are sawed across the quarters. This gives that peculiar grain that makes this wood so popular.

"To produce the beautiful grains of mahogany found in pieces of antique furniture it was necessary to saw thin strips around the circumference of the log and then veneer it to heavier pieces to prevent warping. This is done in the case of bird's eye maple and other exceptionally beautiful grains. The log is put on a special machine which rotates it while the saw cuts a continuous strip until the log is used up.

"Ordinary pine, fir and hemlock logs are sawed to get the greatest amount of lumber from them with the least waste."

WHIP-WOMEN IN LONDON QUIT

Forced to Abandon Ancient Concession Because of Automobiles

LONDON, Feb. 12.—The whip-women of Convent Garden are going to abandon the precincts of this famous ponce market for the same reason that the village blacksmith is becoming an automobile salesman. The whip-women are among the picturesque denizens that go along with this most picturesque market square, and for the last 300 years an unbroken line of members of their families have checked

the whips of the produce growers who frequent this market.

This concession of whip checking, which has supported many families for so long a time, was granted to six ancestors of the present-day whip-women in the sixteenth century when Convent garden was really a convent garden of the Monks of Westminster, outside which the farmers brought their garden trucks to sell. In that century half a dozen whip-women took charge of the whips of the farmers to keep them from the hands of thieves, and collected a penny from the owner at the end of the day. The number of whip-women has grown to 12 because some women left their share of the concession to two daughters, but even though the price of checking whips is now three pence, the whip-women of today cannot make a living, they say.

KLAMATH MEN WILL ATTEND PHI KAPPA PSI ANNUAL GATHER

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 12.—Will Ganong and George W. McIntyre, both of Klamath Falls, and Clyde Davis of Chiloquin, are expected to participate in the annual Founders' day dinner of the Oregon Alumni association of Phi Kappa Psi, to be held at the Hotel Portland, February 21.

Mr. McIntyre and Mr. Davis are members of the chapter of the fraternity at the University of Oregon. Mr. Ganong was initiated while a student at Vanderbilt university, Nashville, Tenn.

In addition to a host of Phi Kappa Psi alumni from all parts of the state and a number from Washington, the entire chapter at

Phi Kappa Psi was founded at Washington and Jefferson college, Washington, Pa., February 19, 1852. The Oregon alumni association holds its annual dinner on the Saturday nearest this date to allow members of the chapter at Eugene to attend.

The fraternity now numbers 48 chapters. Those on the coast are the University of Washington, University of Oregon, Stanford university and University of California.

Immigrants Traveling First Class to South America

BUENOS AIRES, Feb. 12.—A line of one-class passenger ships devoted exclusively to the transportation of emigrants has been inaugurated between European and South American ports by a German steamship company. The first ship of the line to arrive here brought 1900 German and other Europeans to Brazil and 1600 to Argentina.

The ship provides first class comforts and conveniences for the third class price. She has 250 cabins, accommodating two, four and six persons each, with salon, smoking room, library, reading room, two large dining rooms, barber shop and baths. She is a motor propelled ship with a speed of 15 knots.
