

# PRISON SCHOOL TO BE STARTED

### Convicts at San Quentin Will Enjoy Modern Education

SAN FRANCISCO, Feb. 13.—A high school with a complete four-year course leading to a diploma and accredited to the state university will be established in San Quentin state penitentiary, according to plans approved by the State Prison Board and Frank J. Smith, the new warden.

It is intended to maintain the scholastic standards and curriculum of outside high schools. Modern school equipment will be installed. Manual training and practical shop courses will be included and a laboratory fitted out for research in the scientific classes.

The faculty is expected to be obtained from the ranks of the convicts. A recent check of San Quentin records indicated that 19 prisoners had degrees in arts, sciences, law and medicine from leading colleges and universities in this country and Europe.

# JOHNSON QUITS AS APPRAISER

### Klamath County Agent for State Bonus Commission Resigns Office

After continual service since 1921, Morris L. Johnson, deputy county assessor, has handed his resignation to Commissioner Pierce as a member of the state appraisal board of the soldiers' bonus.

Mr. Johnson's resignation was accepted by the governor with regret. Governor Pierce stated that he appreciated Mr. Johnson's excellent work in minimizing the losses on soldier loans.

Pressure of other business was given by Mr. Johnson as his reason for resigning. It is understood that at the next meeting of the World War Veterans state aid commission a successor to Mr. Johnson from this county will be appointed. The board is composed of Governor Pierce, Secretary of State Sam A. Kozler, Adjutant-General George A. White, W. C. Culbertson and Edward F. Bailey.

Mr. Bell, in his complaint, stated that his wife kept her step-son in constant fear, to such an extent that he was sometimes obliged to stay at home during the day.

LONDON, Feb. 13.—The unemployed at Wivenhoe, near Colchester, have found a patron in an aged wealthy American, Bayard Brown, who lives on his yacht Valfrey, high and dry in a local dock, and who made a substantial donation to the unemployed Christmas fund. Some years ago Mr. Brown made a similar donation to the unemployed at Brightlingsea, where his yacht was then laid up.

Mr. Brown has been somewhat of a mystery in English coast towns, as his yacht seldom puts to sea and its owner rarely leaves its dock.

# BRITISH AUTOMOBILE PIONEER GETS SUMMONS AFTER 29 YRS.

BIRMINGHAM, Feb. 13.—Fredrick William Lanchester, who designed and built the first petrol-driven motorcar in Great Britain and who since 1896 has held a license for driving, recently was summoned for the first time for a breach of the rules and regulations of the road.
