OUT OF THE AIR

Prof. C. Engelhardt, scientist from Medford, Oregon, advances a new theory for the "fading" phenomena, of radio, which reveals a new phase toward the solution of this little known annoyance in radio. Prof. Engelhardt states that the fading is entirely due to collision of carrier waves in broadcasting stations. He says:

That the collision of carrier waves is responsible for the fading annoyance in radio reception occurred to me several months ago as the result of study of local conditions and those prevailing at the point of broadcasting.

Elimination of the carrier wave is the most logical solution of this problem. That this may be done, I feel reasonably certain the certainty depends upon the results of experiments which are now being conducted.

Another solution is the allocation of the carrier wave to the broadcasting stations. If a distribution can be made that will place not more than one station on a wave length, fading will disappear. As long as there are two stations on a wave length, no matter how far the stations may be apart on the continent. We will continue to have fading, if both are broadcasting at the same time.

BRITISH BIRTHS NOW ON DECLINE

Educator Claims There Will Be 2,000,000 Less Workers in 1932

MANCHESTER, Feb. 13.—Decline in the birth rate in England has become a national peril in the opinion of Sir Robert Blair, former chief education officer of the London County Council, who, speaking at a Manchester educational conference, estimated that within the next eight years there would be 2,000,000 fewer workers in this country.

"Within the last few years, the birth rate has fallen off tremendously," he said, "and appears even yet to be going down. We are losing 100,000 children a year from each age group in the schools and on this basis, from calculations I have made, by 1932 there will be some 2,000,000 less workers in England."

Taking this year as an example, asserted Sir Robert, the board of education is budgeting for a million less children than in its budget of 14 years ago.

Decrease of the birth rate during

the years of the war in some measure accounts for the reduction in the number of children who are now attending school age, according to ministry of health officials.
