Loucks sought to shut down those places he alleges are violating city and state laws. But the police committee, check-mated his efforts, and as a result a number of places are being permitted to operate over the protest of the mayor and chief of police.

That this is but the beginning of a bitter fight between Chief Loucks and the police committee was forecast today. In spite of the restrictions placed upon him, Chief Loucks intends to keep a close watch over the pool rooms and hotels and again demand the revocation of their licenses when he finds any evidence of law violations.

It is generally understood that the strained relations between Chief Loucks and the council police committee is due to the efforts of the police committee to run the police department, regardless of the wishes or recommendations of the police chief.

Chief Loucks declared today that Councilman Cofer had demanded that he appoint Lee Craft, ex-patrolman, to fill the place vacated by J. E. Franey when he was appointed street commissioner. Loucks ignored the demands of the councilman and appointed a man of his own choosing, and this, naturally did not set well with Councilman Cofer.

"While I have nothing in the world against Craft personally, I insist that I am going to be the one to hire and fire the men while I am chief of police," asserted Chief Loucks today. "Also I am going to run this police department, regardless of the wishes of any man or any group of men."

What the outcome of the controversy may be not even those closest in touch with municipal matters would venture to forecast, but with Mayor Goddard and chief Loucks determined to improve moral conditions and give Klamath Falls its much-needed and long-delayed cleaning, things ought to grow interesting if the police committee continues in its efforts to block the announced program for a cleaner and better city.

TACOMA, Wash., Feb. 17.—Sam Markow, wanted by Tacoma police in connection with the murder of Harry Schmidt, manager of a branch bank here, and the robbing of the bank on February 7, was arrested in Seattle yesterday.

Tacoma police indicated that the capture of Markow completes the list of those wanted in connection with the fatal shooting.

## SOLICIT AID IN ROAD LOCATION

Twenty-Nine Beatty Residents Want Highway Routed Their Way

Not only is the route through Beatty more direct but also the material necessary to lay a solid road foundation is near at hand, is the claim of residents of Beatty who desire to have the contemplated state highway construction east from Bonanza routed by way of Beatty.

Twenty-nine residents of Beatty have petitioned the county court to lend them their support in bringing to the attention of the state highway commission the feasibility of routing the road through Beatty.

Communication from Daggett, Schalkoek Investment company was read to the council in which conditions were set down by which the city would receive the Henrietta Melhase property for a library site. The deed was referred to the city attorney who will attempt to obtain an extension of time on the erection of the library. The deed calls for a two year limit.

The usual bills of the city were passed upon with the bill of the Klamath Development company amounting to \$8.96 referred to the finance committee.

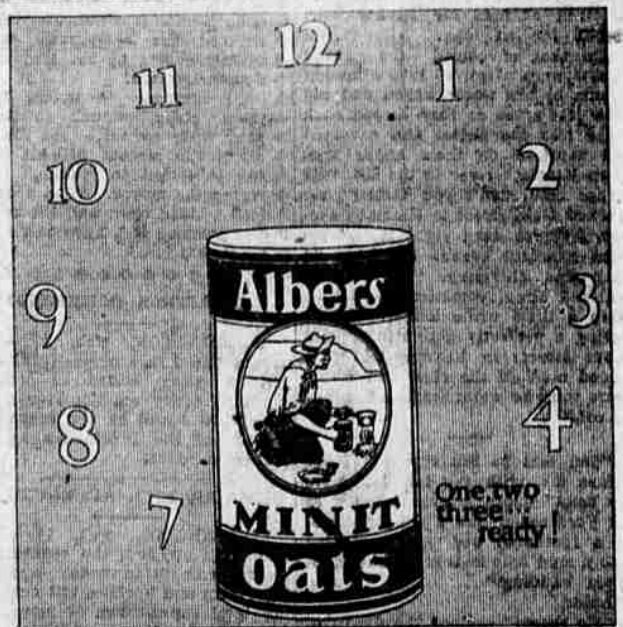
