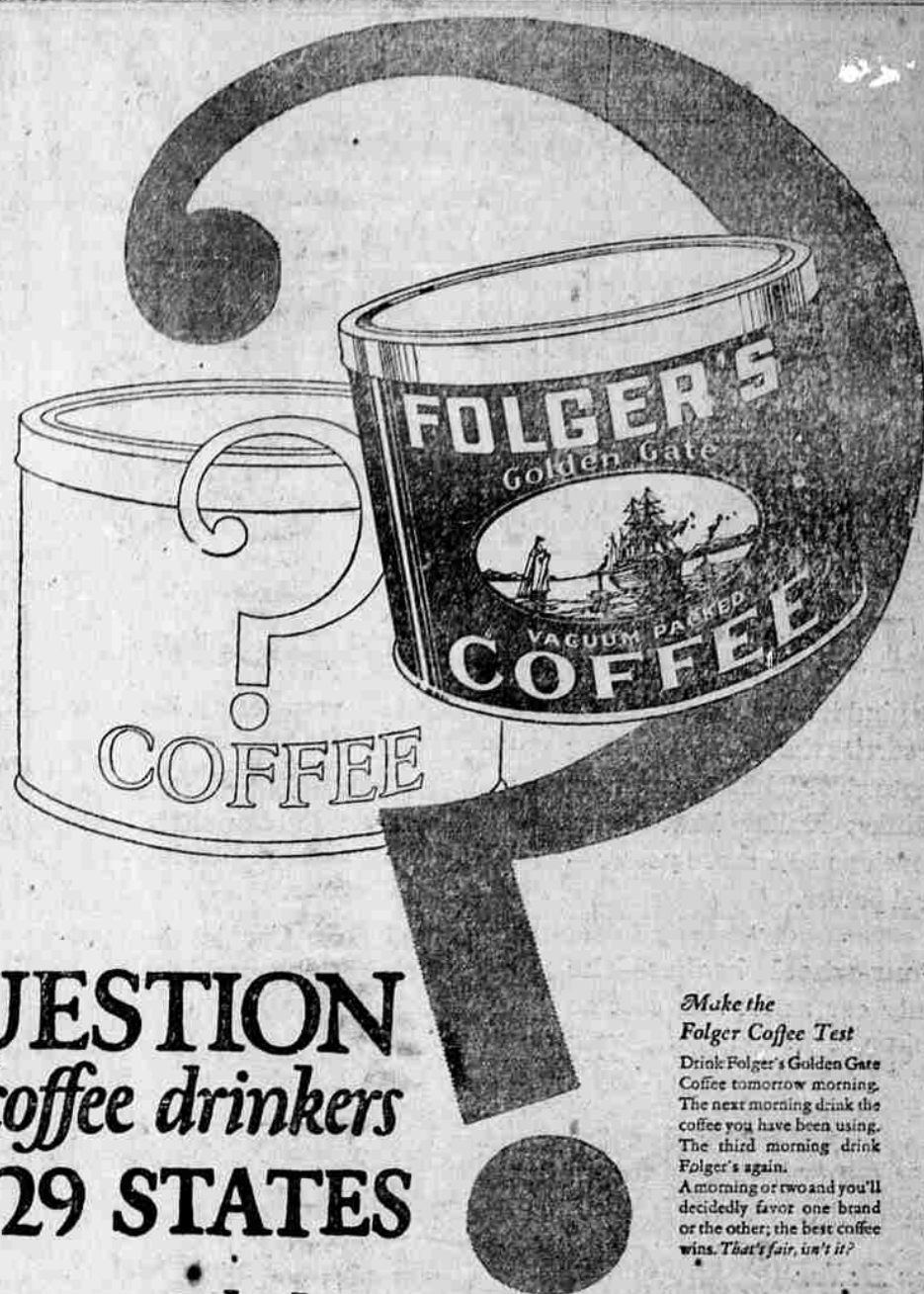
Of unusual interest in the annals of Midland school activities was the debate held Friday afternoon by pupils of the seventh and eighth grades, when, in the opinion of the
