**RECKLESS DRIVER GETS STIFF JOLT**

BEND, Ore., Feb. 18.—George Nosker of Wasco county was fined \$250, sentenced to 30 days in jail, his driver's license permanently revoked and then a warrant charging possession of liquor was read to him in jail to top it off. The fine and jail sentence together with the revocation of license was meted out to him yesterday in justice court where he appeared to answer to a charge of reckless driving following an accident on The Dalles-California highway during the early hours of last Saturday morning. Three members of the party of five were injured, one seriously. Nosker, driver of the car, escaped without injury.

**SHIP BROCCOLI**  
ROSEBURG, Ore., Feb. 18.—A few crates of early broccoli have been received on the local market, and shipments will probably be made within a few days. This is the extremely early crop, as the harvest does not start until about the first of March. Warm weather, however, is causing an early maturity in many places, and express shipments will doubtless be frequent until carload lot movements start in March.

**The Weather—**

**Buy Horses—**  
J. J. Villair, woods superintendent of the Ewauna Box company logging camp at Lumberton, north of Chiloquin, was a business visitor in Klamath Falls yesterday. In past years, the Ewauna camp has been using rented horses for logging operations. This year it was decided to buy the horses and it was for this purpose that Mr. Villair was in town today. Active logging operations will start at Lumberton about March 15, it was said. Several million feet of logs that were cut off steep slopes during the winter will be loaded onto cars and shipped down to the plant in Klamath Falls for manufacture before any falling will be started. Mr. Villair has been spending most of his time during the past few weeks getting the camp at Lumberton in shape to open next month.

**Favor Community Building—**  
"Yes, the proposed community building at Bonanza is meeting with much favor in Bonanza and territory adjacent to the town." It was Francis J. Bowne, chairman of the county school board, talking yesterday in the county school superintendent's office. "They have organized a community club," Mr. Bowne continued, and are laying tentative plans toward the raising of money with which to finance the community project. Whether or not we would be able to build a hall as spacious as the one contemplated by the Merrill community is yet to be seen. Committees have been appointed to look into the matter and the proposition is being given the careful thought of the citizens of Bonanza. It would certainly mean a fine thing for the city, if the civic center could be put over the top."

**Condition Improving—**  
Condition of Joseph Jensen, who has been severely ill during the past week, has shown decided improvement. Mr. Jensen is connected with the county engineering department and is actively in control of all county road projects. Mr. Swansen drove continuously between Klamath Falls and Pasadena, without sleep. He started on Sunday morning and arrived in Pasadena early Monday night.

The Klamath Falls - Lakeview highway between Olene and Bonanza is in good shape, is the report of County School Clerk Fred Peterson, on his return from a school inspection trip in that territory yesterday. The road is choppy and rutty for the first few miles south of Klamath Falls. Mr. Peterson said, but from there on east to Bonanza is in good condition.

**BOMB CAUSES \$125,000 LOSS**

PITTSBURGH, Feb. 18.—Three buildings in the Penn Avenue wholesale produce district of Pittsburgh were demolished by a series of explosions early today with a loss of \$125,000. Windows in a score of other buildings were shattered. Many residents of the region were thrown from their beds by the force of the blast. They escaped with minor injuries.

After an investigation, Fire Marshal Thomas Pfarr reported he believed the first explosion was a dynamite bomb, set off in one of the buildings. This blast, he said, was followed by gas explosions.
