ANOTHER ARMS CONFERENCE IS COOLIDGE AIM

Informal Discussion in London Does Little to Advance Matter

WASHINGTON, Feb. 18.—An informal discussion of a new arms conference, to be called by President Coolidge, has been proceeding in London but officials here indicated today that no definite results had been attained.

The state department would not discuss the subject beyond authorizing the statement that the conversations had not yet reached the point of an exchange of formal notes.

It is surmised, in the absence of official comment that the steps taken look to an extension of the Washington naval treaty so as to include a limitation on auxiliary craft as well as capital ships.

Such a project was under consideration here at the league of nations brought forward its plan for an arms conference to be held under league auspices. That plan since has encountered obstacles and President Coolidge has said he only waited an opportune moment to make a conference suggestion of his own.

Copco Not Isolated From Outside World, Say Power Officials

Although the various roads leading to Copco have been more or less impassable for the past few weeks, Copco has by no means been isolated from the outside world, according to officials at the local office of the company.

It was reported that the bulk of the traffic, both freight and passenger, has been routed by the Copco-Thrall railroad since last fall. This road, which is owned and operated by the California Oregon Power company, connects with the Southern Pacific at Thrall, and is used mainly for the purpose of transporting heavy shipments of equipment and materials necessary for the completion of the new Copco plant No. 2. When completed this new power house will add 40,000 electrical horsepower to the generating capacity of the present plants, of which there are now nine, including the new Eastside plant in this city.

Bulgarian Government and Communists Fight

SOFIA, Feb. 18.—The strife between the Bulgarian government and the Communists is growing in intensity.

Todor Stamboloff, a communist deputy was shot and killed yesterday. His assassins firing on their pursuers, wounded an army officer.

At Philippopolis the secretary of the police department was killed and the chief of police wounded in an ambush set by Communists.

Communists numbering twenty came over the Serbian border near Vidno and raided a village.

They were, however, repulsed and one was killed.

COPCO COMPANY USES TRACTOR AS LOCOMOTIVE

It will probably be news to many to learn that a tractor may be used as a locomotive, but not only can it be used, but it is being used by the Copco organization for just such a purpose. The tractor referred to is what is known as the Fordson locomotive and is now in use at the big Copco No. 2 project on the Klamath River to facilitate the hauling of heavy materials on one of the narrow gauge railroads, which are in operation over there.

This equipment consists of the regular farm tractor fitted with special locomotive wheels and brakes and a heavy locomotive frame with drawbar heads and bumpers. The complete unit weighs four tons and is designed to handle a load of approximately thirty tons. This unique locomotive hauls heavy loads of lumber, steel and concrete used in the construction of the tunnels and pipe lines which carry the im-
