

GUARDSMEN HIT BY STATE URGE TO ECONOMIZE

Adjutant General White Says Reduction in Appropriation Spells Ruin

STATE HOUSE, SALEM, Feb. 18.—At the meeting of the ways and means committee last night protests were made by those departments that the committee proposes shall pay 10 or 15 per cent of their reports into the general fund of the state.

The committee last night backed a slice off the estimated needs of the Oregon National Guard that will be ruinous, according to Adjutant General White. The General asked members of the committee after the meeting if he could make a second appearance. No promises were made him, and Chairman Gordon of the house committee told White he was afraid it would serve him no purpose.

In the matter of transferring funds of Union High School District No. 1.

Whereas, in filing its estimate of money to be expended in 1924 the Union High School District No. 1, of Malin, Oregon specified under "indebtedness" Bonded and Interest thereon the sum of \$1020.00; and

Whereas, on January 29, 1924 this Court made and entered an order levying a tax upon the property included in said Union High School District, which said order is recorded at page 30, in Vol. 9, of the Commissioner's Journal, and reads as follows, to-wit: Union High School No. 1.

It appearing from the certificate of the clerk of the District that it will be necessary to raise the sum of \$4215.09, for bond purposes and the further sum of \$4101.28, special, and that the valuation of property in said High School District is \$437,704.00; It is therefore ordered and there is hereby levied a tax of 9.63 mills on the dollar for special purposes upon the property in said district.

And Whereas, in said order making such levy it was inadvertently provided and ordered that the sum of \$4215.09 be raised for bond purposes, when in fact, said figures should have been \$1920.00; and

Whereas, the Board of Directors of said Union High School District No. 1, of Malin, Oregon, having requested that this Court make an order transferring all of said funds except the said sum of \$1920.00, so raised for bond purposes, into the General Fund of said District, for the purpose of taking care of outstanding warrants; and

Whereas, this Court is satisfied and it appearing to the best interests of the said district that such transfer should be made:

Now, Therefore, It is Ordered, that the sum of \$129.00 so raised for bond purposes to be expended in 1924 by said Union High School District No. 1, be retained in said fund for such bond purposes, and that all the rest and residue of said money in such bond fund be and the same is hereby transferred and placed into the General Fund of said Union High School District No. 1, for the purpose of taking care of outstanding warrants, and other expenses incurred by said district.

It is further ordered, that the County Treasurer of Klamath County be authorized, and he is hereby directed to make such transfer of funds as herein designated and ordered.
