OUT OF THE AIR

Radio listeners in this week will be favored with two master works to be for the first time released over radio. The offerings are Gracioso Creation, by Hayden, to be given on Friday evening and Elijah by Mendelssohn to be given on Saturday night.

"Creation" will be picked up by remote control from the First Presbyterian church, Oakland, and broadcasted for the invisible audience throughout the country. Six artists will take the principal parts in the oratorio, and choirs from churches in Alameda, Berkeley and Oakland will send numbers for a large chorus. Walter B. Kennedy will conduct the work which is said to be the biggest thing yet attempted in the way of producing an oratorio over the air.

Mendelssohn's "Elijah" will be given on Saturday by KGO soloists and chorus in the studio under the direction of Carl Anderson. An address, "Mendelssohn Oratorios", will be given by C. B. Brown.

KPKX, at Hastings, Nebraska, has been granted temporary license to broadcast with 1500 watts power. This to remain in effect temporarily, with the understanding that this increase does not interfere with other stations in operation, and proves practical. This makes nine stations in the United States using 1500 watts to date.
