Down From The Fort—

Where the cows grow fat and produce milk with a minimum amount of butter fat—that is Fort Klamath. It is said that the northern Klamath basin farmers have to labor the least for their crops than any ranchers from any other section of the Klamath country, all because nature has been generous to that section of the county, which is recognized as one of the most beautiful spots in the Klamath territory during the spring and summer. In From Bonanza—

One of the real old pioneers of the Klamath country is J. L.
