### AT THE LIBERTY

Definite plans for the formation of a Klamath Falls baseball team which will seek to enter a league in this section will be laid at a general meeting of baseball enthusiasts Friday evening at the chamber of commerce quarters.

Interest has been aroused throughout the city over the prospect of giving Klamath Falls a good semi-pro baseball team, and many number of merchants and business men have pledged to support a good baseball team.

At the meeting Friday night it is expected an executive or finance committee will be chosen and active work started on the question of financing a team. Dr. G. A. Massey, who was appointed by the chamber of commerce to inquire into baseball sentiment locally, will preside.

### Balloon Tires Optional on All New Ford Cars

Probably the most important news in automobile circles during the last week was the announcement that balloon tires are to be furnished as optional equipment on all types of Ford cars.

This is probably the greatest recognition given balloons since their introduction on the market, and should prove an impetus to their popularity.

The Ford Motor company has long been interested in balloon tires and has been carrying on experiments with them for some time. Its decision to supply balloons comes only after severe tests which coupled with the good results obtained by individual owners, have proven these tires to be thoroughly practical for Ford cars.

To compensate for the harder steering with balloon tires, a special steering gear with a greater reduction will be installed on all cars carrying these tires.

Balloons to be furnished for new Ford cars will be of standard size 29x4.0, straight side and mounted of wood wheels. This equipment will be available at a comparatively small additional cost to the new car purchaser.

Arrangements also have been made for providing dealers with balloon tire equipment so that any Ford car owner who desires to do so can change over for high pressure tires.

Several carloads of the new equipment are expected at Portland very shortly and just as soon as possible after that, Ford cars with balloon tires will be on display by all authorized Ford dealers.

### KLAMATH STUDENT GETS HIGH HONORS

OREGON AGRICULTURAL COLLEGE, CORVALLIS, Feb. 24.—Noah H. Truax, of Klamath Falls, junior in electrical engineering, was pledged to Tau Beta Pi national honorary engineering fraternity, Wednesday. Mr. Truax has a scholastic average of 95.3 for his first two years at college.

Scholarship, character, and interest in engineering are the primary qualifications for membership. Men elected to Tau Beta Pi must be in the upper fourth of seniors or upper eighth of juniors in engineering in regard to scholarship. A failure in any subject bars a candidate from election. This fraternity was founded in 1885 at Lehigh university to stimulate interest scholarship in engineering by the prize of membership. It now has 46 chapters in the outstanding technical institutions of the nation.

Mr. Truax is also a member of Sigma Nu society fraternity on the O. A. C. campus.

### ANOTHER GAS PROBE ASKED OF CONGRESS

WASHINGTON, Feb. 24.—Another investigation into gasoline prices was proposed in congress today, Representative McDuffie, Democrat, Alabama, introducing a resolution to direct the federal trade commission to make an inquiry.

The resolution declared that during the past month an "enormous" increase "apparently unwarranted" had been made in the price of gasoline, amounting in some states to eight cents a gallon. It proposes that the trade commission ascertain if there is a combination.

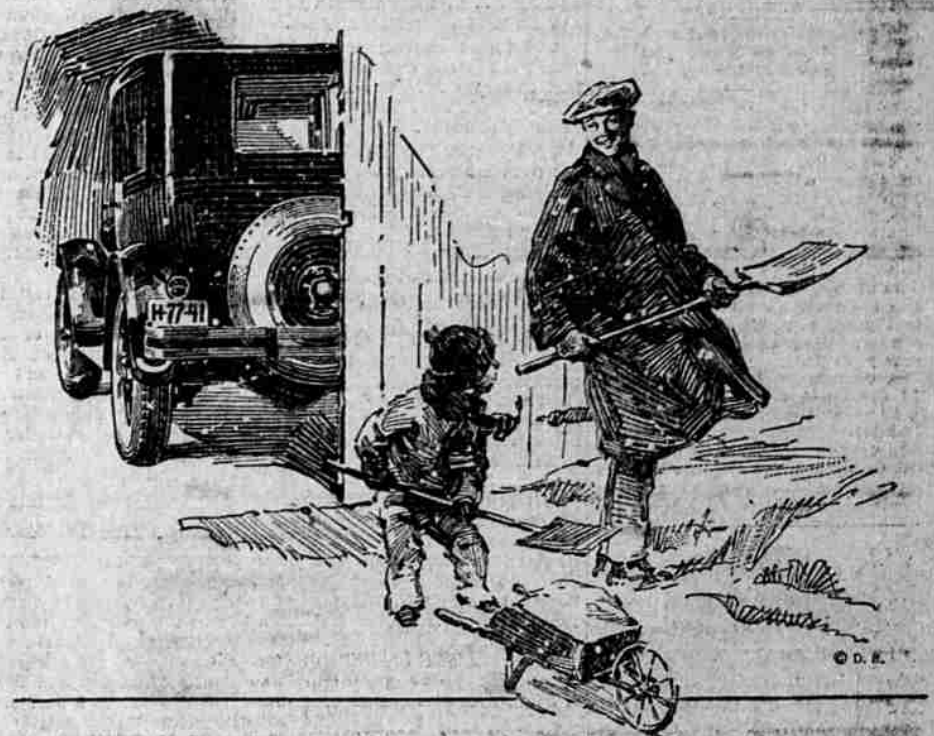

### 66,647 Japanese in Hawaii Have American Citizenship

HONOLULU, Feb. 24.—A total of 1,265 American citizens of Japanese ancestry registered as voters in the territorial election in the last fiscal year, according to the report of Governor Wallace R. Farrington to Secretary of the Interior Hubert Work. The number of American citizens of Chinese ancestry who registered was 1,840.

Of the Japanese population of 125,368 in the territory, 66,647 were born in the island and therefore are American citizens, Governor Farrington said.
