(Continued from Page One) about 350 yards long, went dry so quickly that the fish could not make their way back to the main channel before their escape was cut off.

No Motive Given The power company did not notify Barnes, Short or Molschenbacher that the water would be shut off, thus imperiling fish life in Link river, the three game wardens announced today.

John C. Boyle, division manager of the company, stated today that the matter was called to his attention this morning and that this afternoon water was turned into the stream that will carry the dead and dying fish back into the river and thus avoid any health menace to the community.

"I don't see why all the fuss," Mr. Boyle said. "I know nothing of the matter till this morning but now that we know we can handle the situation, it is my understanding that all the fish that were caught were mullets and suckers and that to date only six trout have been found."
