V. Kuykendall, has just returned to this city. Mr. Kuykendall stated that from what he could gather among business circles, that all eyes are turned toward Klamath Falls. He pointed out that the increased attention of business in-

terests to the great Klamath country was due to the contemplated railroad expansion and the activity in the lumbering industry in and around Klamath Falls.

Goes To Medford—

Sanford Jones, local grocer, left this morning for Medford to supervise the construction of the interior of his store in that city. Mr. Jones expects to open a store in Medford, similar in size to the one here, about March 29.

Word On Division Point—

That the opinion of Klamath Falls on the selection of a division point for the Southern Pacific lines, when the Natron Cut-Off extension is completed, will be carefully considered from every angle by Southwestern Pacific officials, is the word received yesterday by J. A. Gordon from H. D. Mortenson, president of the P. H. D. Mortenson company. Despite rumors to the contrary, the S. P. company has not definitely decided on the division point. However it is known that the officials favor Fuego, a point north of Kirk on the ground that that spot is just half-way between Dunsuir and Eugene and besides is just at the base of the steep climb over the Cascades. The petition submitted to the officials, contained all the arguments for the establishment of a division point in Klamath Falls. The chamber of commerce submitted the petition to many of the larger shippers for their indorsements.

Bonds Approved—

According to word just received by City School Clerk Ida B. Moser, the bond transcript has been approved by bond attorneys and \$65,000 is on the way from the sale of the Central school bond issue. The first money received from the sale of the bonds will be disbursed to the Episcopal church for the property on Seventh and High.

Mills School Wins—

Mills Addition public school waves the banner of victory today by virtue of their victory over the four other city schools in attendance. Under the guidance of Mrs. J. A. Lagerson, the pupils scored a decisive win. Other schools that received pennants for class averages were: Riverside school, seventh grade; Pelican Bay school, intermediate; Central school, sixth grade; Fairview school, sixth grade, and Mills Addition school, second grade.

Discuss Road Route—

When the state highway commission meets tomorrow in Portland, they will find that a large bloc of Klamath people decidedly favor the routing of the Klamath Falls-Lakeview highway by way of Bonanza, Hearty and Bly instead of by way of Dairy to Hearty and Bly, as is sponsored by some authorities. At a meeting held in Bonanza yesterday, Langell's valley farmers joined with Bonanza citizens in urging that the highway be routed through Bonanza on the ground that the road will serve more people than by the shorter route proposed from Dairy. It was hoped that the highway commission would stand by their original highway route of last year, which routed the highway through Bonanza.

Shaw Bertram To Start—

Within a week, 90 men will be working at the Shaw Bertram Lumber camp, nine miles east of Kirk. J. F. Potter, logging superintendent announced yesterday afternoon. It is expected to cut 150,000 feet of logs a day in the near future. Two shifts will start at the Shaw-Bertram mill on Monday.

Another Scarlet Fever Case—

A home in Summers district was placed under quarantine yesterday when sickness of a child was diagnosed as scarlet fever. The school which the child attends will not be

fumigated as she has not attended school during the past few days.

Express Appreciation—

Appreciation was expressed by members of the chamber of commerce at their weekly forum luncheon today, to the Klamath Bakery, through G. G. Johnson, who supplied the excellent bread served at the meal.

From La Grande—

A. W. Schrock of La Grande, Oregon, is in the city for several days, in the interest of establishing a building and loan association in the city. Schrock was in the city six years ago and expressed keen interest in the rapid growth of the city. According to Schrock, it is not impossible for Klamath Falls to set her gait within the next ten years, so that she will rival the city of Spokane, which he claims, is situated similarly to Klamath Falls.
