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**FORUM HEARS REV. BOBBITT**

**"Washington, the Man" Is Chosen for Address to Chamber Forum**

"A great movement is but the shadow of a great personality," and upon this quotation was based the address given by the Rev. W. E. Bobbitt of the Christian church, on "Washington, the Man," given before members and guests of the chamber of commerce forum this noon. Seldom has the forum committee been fortunate in getting the services of so interesting a speaker who held the attention of his audience so completely with his deliverance.

"Things stand not because they are provincial, but because they are eternal," said Mr. Bobbitt, "and we celebrate the lives and executions of these men, for in our sorer moments they come back to us in serious mien. If we abuse our privileges or if we abuse our liberties we will tread around and around and get nowhere. Freedom are apt to turn their selfish side to human nature, forgetting the paths by which they descended."

Other phases of the life of Washington were given, with a short retrospect of the English attitude before and during the Revolutionary period when George Washington was brought to the foreground of that great struggle. Urging the observance and love of American liberty, Rev. Bobbitt concluded his address.
