Land Leased

According to H. D. Newell, director of reclamation, approximately 24,000 acres of government land in the Tule Lake district has been leased following the call for bids which were extended last week. Average bid went at \$1 an acre, the highest at \$4-10. The land is in better condition than last year due to the increased moisture and brought more on this fact. Twenty five thousand acres still remain which will be sold in from 80 to 320 acre tracts for \$40 a tract. The land not leased for farming will be used by ranchers in that district for grazing.
