FOREIGN TRADE AT NEW NORMAL

Danish-American Trade Is Back to Standard, According to Minister

COPENHAGEN, Feb. 26.—Writing in the Nationaltidende on trade between Denmark and the United States during 1924, Dr. John Delys Prineo, the American minister to Denmark, says that although the figures for the trade between the two countries for 1924 are not yet complete, it appears certain that the mutual trade has increased during the past year and is probably now at what might be called a new normal, following the hectic spurt in 1919 and 1920.

"The Danish market is an attractive one for American products," Mr. Prineo says, "because of Denmark's increased industrial activities, the high standard of living within the country, and the well maintained purchasing power of its people. These factors, together with the almost complete elimination of some competitive elements, and also a growth of direct commercial intercourse between the two countries have tended to increase the participation of the United States in the Danish import trade from 10 per cent in 1913 to 13 per cent in 1923. In fact, the United States now follows Germany and Great Britain in order of importance as a supplier of the Danish market."

Scientists Keep Alive Rancors of World War

GOTTINGEN, Feb. 26.—German scientists are still being ignored in connection with international congresses, though the world war is over, according to a compilation of facts presented by the German Universities Association.

During 1923 and 1924, the report points out, 91 international scientific and technical congresses took place. In the case of 58 of them no Germans were invited; in the case of the remaining 33 certain allied countries, notably France and Belgium, either refrained entirely from sending delegates or sent as it became known that Germans also were to participate, or else sent unrepresentative delegations.

PORTLAND, Ore., Feb. 26.—Mike Yokel, Salt Lake light heavyweight, won two of three falls from Billy Edwards, Kansas City wrestler, here last night. After each had won a fall, and with three minutes of the third period remaining, Yokel took the deciding tangle with a half Nelson and croch hold.

LEGISLATORS WILL ADJOURN

STATE HOUSE, Salem, Ore., Feb. 26.—Having enacted revenue measures calculated to produce enough money in the next biennium to meet appropriations without increasing the levy on property for state purposes, the legislature was to adjourn today.

Passage by the senate late yesterday of a bill to tax cigarettes, smoking tobacco, snuff, cigarette papers and tubes, another bill imposing a gross earnings tax on utilities and a measure requiring payment into the general fund of 10 per cent of the earnings of self supporting state commissioners, ended a fight in which Governor Walter M. Pierce had stood out for this legislation, as opposed to an increase in the levy on property. Cigars and chewing tobacco were exempted from the new tax by an amendment adopted before the cigarette tax bill passed.

While the tobacco tax bill was up for final passage Senator Roy W. Ritter of Pendleton, predicted that the governor would become the target for a recall election within six months, because of the revenue program we forced the legislature to accept.

Senator Milton R. Klepper of Portland, declared that referendum would be invoked against the tobacco tax. He said the referendum machinery is already "being hoisted up."

Senator Jay H. Upton, of Bend, moved that a referendum clause be attached to the tobacco tax bill, but the motion was lost.

The house yesterday afternoon tabled the house concurrent resolution criticizing C. E. Spence, state market agent, for his political activities before the last election.

Among senate bills passed by the house late yesterday were: 207, Unatilla delegation; authorizing grain and forage crop experimental and demonstration work in eastern Oregon.
