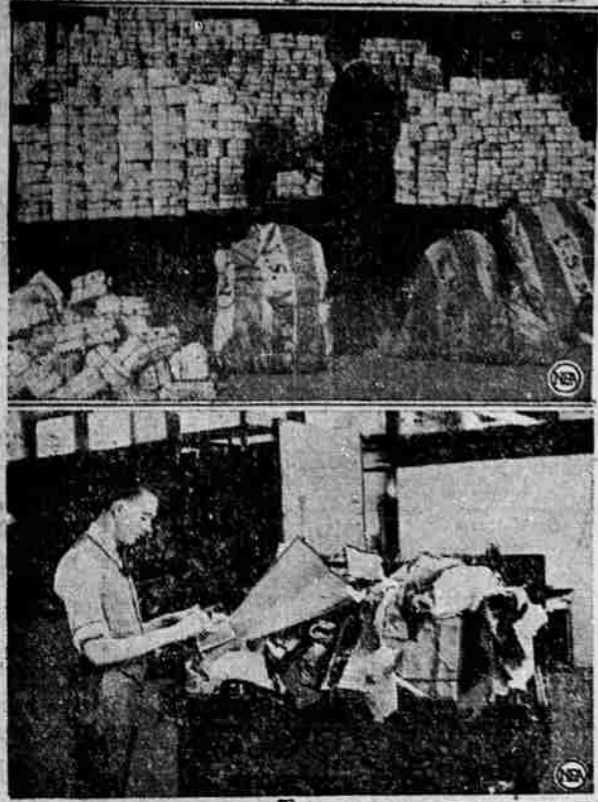


Worth Taking a Chance On

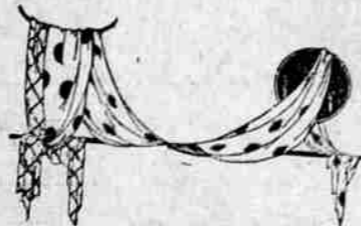
