### COAL CAUSE OF BIG FOG LOSS

LONDON, Feb. 27.—Londoners have tackled with renewed energy this winter the problem of reducing their fog bill which often causes a loss to the community of \$5,000,000 a day.

Scientists have concluded that while it was impossible altogether to abolish fogs, as provided by nature, it is possible to have comparatively clearer ones by doing away with the soft coal smoke evil caused by some 4,000,000 to 5,000,000 smoking chimneys.

Officials of the Coal Smoke Abatement Society estimated recently that there were 600,000 inhabited houses in London nearly every room of which, including the kitchen, has its open fire place by which the homes are heated. These fires pour their quota of dirt and soot into the air all day long and far into the night. Ordinarily the soot is carried off by the elements, but when a heavy fog sets in the particles remain suspended in the atmosphere, shutting out the sun entirely, and turn daylight into darkness. Clear fogs could not do this.

During a recent fog here, which lasted the better part of three days, as most of them do, scientists estimated that there were from 250 to 300 tons of soot floating about in the air within the London area.

Statistics have been compiled showing that London's annual soot-fall amounts to something like 75,000 tons.

Every individual in the city is affected, more or less, by the heavy fogs and smoke nuisance. Traffic sometimes comes almost to a standstill, and shop dealers often close up their stores because of lack of business. During the fog season this winter alone it has been estimated that the loss to the community has been at least \$25,000,000.

### FEW PORTUGUESE ABLE TO WRITE

LONDON, Feb. 27.—So many people in Portugal cannot read, the percentage of illiterates is given as 78, that were it not for Brazil and the colonies, the book industry here could scarcely survive. Also Portuguese authors rarely live on the income derived from literary production; they all do something else.

The government is seeking to overcome the lack of primary education by more schools, but progress is very slow. In the larger towns there is a certain literary culture, but in the provinces the people live much as they did in past ages, isolated from the progressive world.

Books are so expensive that only the relatively wealthy can afford to buy them.

### RATTLERS HEAR FROM TONGUES

LOS ANGELES, Feb. 27.—The original antenna for radio, according to Jack Allman, Los Angeles curator of reptiles, was the rattlesnake's tongue.

"When a rattlesnake is dormant or sleeping," Mr. Allman said recently, "its tongue is idle. But when aroused it starts shooting that forked tongue from its mouth and seems to both feel and hear through it. I have seen rattlesnakes appear as though uninformed of my approach when their tongues were not moving back and forth from their mouths, but the moment they became conscious of
