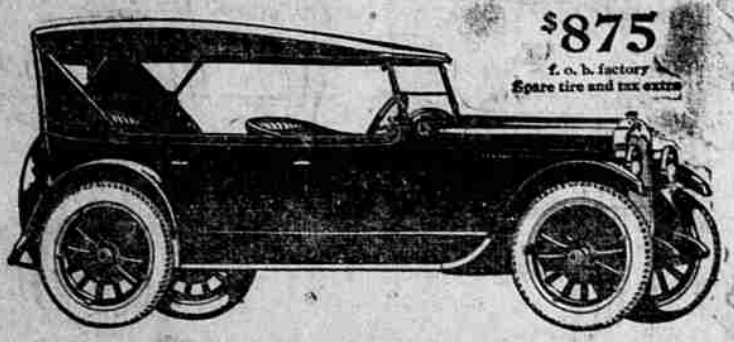

women admitted on cross-examination that their hours were from 9 o'clock or after in the morning until about 4 o'clock in the afternoon. Mrs. Zachariah, who worked there until the police closed the place up, said Mrs. Panos was a wonderful woman and Mr. Panos was a perfect gentleman.

Denies All Charges
 Mrs. Panos made emphatic denial of all charges lodged against her place by the peace officers. She asserted she was trying to operate a clean hotel and wanted to cooperate with the police. She testified she was in a California hospital during December and at the time Mrs. Elavin told of seeing the "fast woman" with the palmed checks and flimsy kimona.

She testified that at the orders of ex-Chief of Police Powell she compelled a couple of Indian girls to vacate. Powell told her they were undesirable, she said. She testified she also ousted other roomers for misconduct, including the unnamed Swede, whose "at home" to the young Indian girl was a part of the social life of the hostelry.

Her Version
 Her testimony was to the effect that she was awakened late at night by the loud swearing of the Indian girl and the Swede, who accused the little damsel of taking 35 "bucks" away from him.

"I told her she would have to give the man's money back or I would call the police," Mrs. Panos testified. "The girl told me to go ahead and call the police, and I did."

She said that when Patrolman Brown arrived and was told of the money-grabbing incident, he laughed and said it was the Swede's hard luck. Brown testified the girl and the Swede had both left by the time he and Bordell arrived.

A Nice Girl
 Concerning the girl who was seen by Deputy Burke, Mrs. Panos was sure the peace officer must be mistaken concerning her character.

"She was sick and under a physician's care most of the time," she said. "And she wasn't a worldly girl at all."

A moment later she related an instance wherein this same unsophisticated young girl had been hostess to a number of young men, and that they made so much noise carousing around she was forced to tell the nice little girl she would have to leave the hotel.

Telegrams Explained
 During the examination of Mrs. Panos there developed an explanation for the three mysterious telegrams which the councilmen sent out last Saturday night as a result

of their secret session. These telegrams were dispatched to the chiefs of police of Portland, Stockton and Sacramento, where Mrs. Panos has been operating hotels for a number of years.

It was plainly evident that the information on which the telegrams were sent had been given to the council by the woman's attorney, but the hotel was spared the expense of producing this evidence through the kindness and charity of the five city councilmen.

Although each chief of police reported different names for the woman—she's been married before—they gave her several hotel ventures a clean bill of health.

Like Kangaroo Court
 All during the hearing City Attorney Carnahan attempted to observe at least a semblance of legal court procedure, but he was overruled in every instance by the council. Every bit of evidence favorable to the hotel was given assiduous mental mastication by the city fathers, but there were times when the council were outspoken in their criticism of the peace officers as well as of the city attorney because he wanted the "hearing" conducted along orderly lines.

Sheriff Burl Hawkins was called "on the carpet" during the closing hours of the inquiry because he had dared to sign his name to a protest against the hotel license when as a matter of fact he had never raided the place.

The sheriff calmly explained that his information had been given to him by his deputies and that they were in the form of official reports and not hearsay evidence. He also testified that the reputation of the place is not good.

Following the cross-examination of the sheriff, City Attorney Carnahan said he would hate to be tried as the sheriff had been as he could tell by the demeanor of the councilmen that he would be convicted. He was plainly disgusted with the way the "hearing" was being conducted and refused to take any part in the examination of the sheriff.

Deception Charged
 But Councilman Roberts accused him of deception because he had based his recommendation on the evidence of his deputies, and Councilman Stuckey thought his evidence was only hearsay.

arrested one Indian for staging a drunken brawl with another Red-skin. He saw a couple of empty bottles on the floor of one Indian's room.

Deputy Sheriff J. W. Hilton testified that he had gone to the hotel early this month seeking evidence in the Pate murder case. He discovered that Sim Pate and Hazel Bentz, a nurse, had been registered together in room 11 on January 1. He said he talked to Panos, concerning the registration and Panos had told him he had registered the pair in the afternoon but wouldn't let them stay that night because they didn't have money to pay for it.

Loucks Takes Stand
 Chief of Police Harry Loucks testified that information concerning the place had been given to him by his patrolmen, and that he gathered from these reports that it hadn't been a morally decent place.

Patrolman J. E. Cooper said he had seen a lot of drunks wend their way into the hotel during the two months he has been on the force, and gathered from his observations that it was a hang-out for drunken people.

Following closely on the heels of this testimony of law violations and immorality within the hotel, Attorney Manning produced 90-year-old W. D. Bailey, grand-father of Mrs. Panos, as the first witness for the hotel.

Just Like A Church
 "She runs her hotel like a church," was his interesting testimony. "Every day is like Sunday at the hotel."

When the ripple of amusement had subsided, he went on to say that his grand-daughter was a good Christian woman who is being unjustly persecuted, although the moral character of Mrs. Panos has never been an issue in the police campaign to clean up the city and the Ray hotel.

Mrs. Mary Zachariah and Mrs. Rose Koese, who have been employed at the place, both testified they had never seen any untoward conduct while they were there. Both
