COPCO WILLING TO BUILD FISH LADDER, CLAIM

Wait on Specifications From Commission, Is Dr. Boyd's Statement

Demand of Klamath sportsmen, that a fish ladder be constructed over Link river dam to provide a waterway for trout running upstream, will be satisfied by the California Oregon Power company if the game commission submits proper plans and specifications for the dam. Dr. W. R. Boyd, president of the Klamath Sportsmen's Association announced last night at a special meeting of the association called for the consideration of a fish ladder.

That the construction of the ladder might be postponed even after the plans and specifications was evident, when it was brought out that the power company is planning to add six feet onto the dam. If this project is furthered this year, it would mean that the ladder would have to be built after the improvement had been completed, otherwise it would mean a duplication of labor and material.

According to Marion Barnes, district game warden, the power company offered to build the ladder
