The High school boys are beginning to play baseball, having track practice every day. The baseball diamond is being moved to the north of the building, where the ground is better.

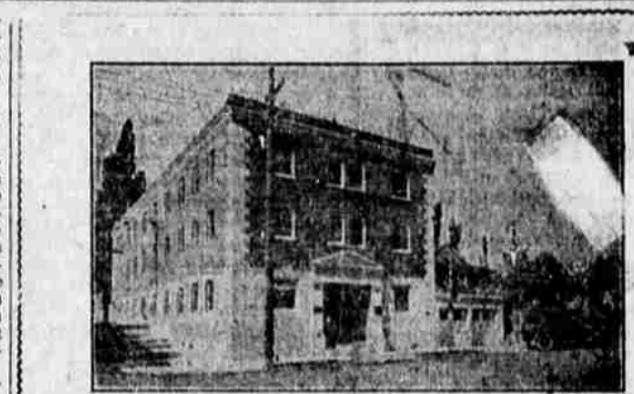
Bert Dawson of Mt. Laki was in Malin buying grain at the mill on Wednesday morning.

COMMITTEE ON R. R. IS NAMED

to do everything in their power to the prosperity of the water users of the Klamath Irrigation district, the board of directors of the district in session this afternoon appointed five men as a transportation committee.

The purpose of appointing the board was to sponsor railroad development in the irrigation district.

The five men appointed were C. C. Hammett, M. Hammond, F. M. Trout, M. H. John Reber and C. W. Eberlein.

Following is the resolution thru which the board was created and the members appointed:

Whereas the Board of Directors of the Klamath Irrigation District has definite, concrete evidence of activity among various railway companies in the matter of extension of railway lines in this direction and vicinity, and

Whereas it is the opinion of this Board that main-line railway transportation through the District is of vital necessity for the continued prosperity and future development of the District and the project generally and that it therefore becomes the duty of this Board to do what it may to secure such transportation, now, therefore,

Be it Resolved that this Board does invite Messrs. C. C. Hulet, E. M. Hammond, F. M. Trout, M. D. John Reber, and C. W. Eberlein to act as a committee on transportation to act with the board in its endeavor to secure proper railway transportation facilities for the benefit of the waterusers of the district, and the project generally, and offers and asks them to use the office of the board and the services of the secretary of the board in such endeavors as they see fit to make to secure such adequate railway transportation as soon as may be.
