Sister of Late Novelist Dies Not Knowing of Brother's Recent Demise

NEW YORK, March 2.—Mrs. Anne Allen Reed, sister of the late James Lane Allen, novelist, died today at her home in Manhattan. She was the last surviving member of the immediate family of the novelist, who died two weeks ago. She was 81 years of age and had been ill for six months. She was never told of the death of her brother because her friends feared the announcement would be fatal to her. One of her last requests was that her brother be not told how she had suffered during the last weeks of her illness.
