ROAD TO ROCKY POINT IMPROVES

**First Auto in Weeks Comes
Through to City By Way
of New Road**

Hot sun, beating onto the road during the past week, has dried up the Rock creek road sufficiently to allow auto traffic, according to Forest Ranger Rogers of the Crater National forest who was in this city yesterday afternoon. For the first time in many weeks, an automobile was able to make the trip from Rocky Point through to Klamath Falls. The car arrived in Klamath Falls yesterday afternoon, little the worse for wear. The best route, according to Mr. Rogers is by way of the New Rock Creek road.

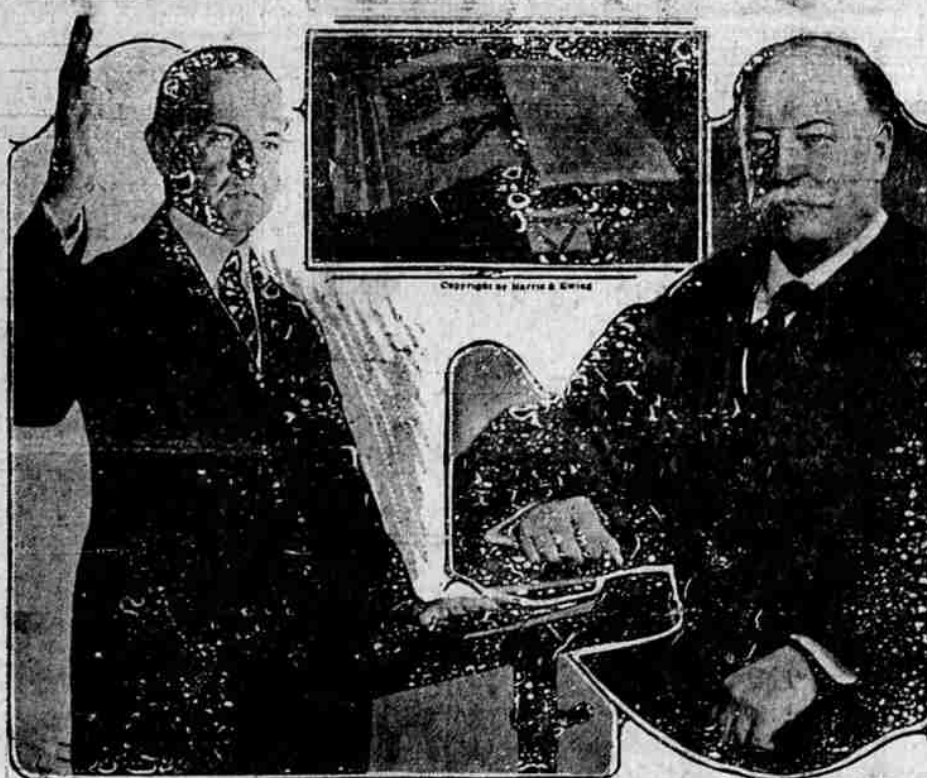
In a week, with the present sunshiny weather continuing, the road will be in good condition for regular auto traffic.

Freight, held up by the impassable road between Klamath Falls and Lakeview, moved westward yesterday when the road became open for the first time in a month. While it was impossible to reach Lakeview by automobile, trips were made regularly with the aid of teams over the impassable stretches. During this period it took two days to make the trip to Lakeview. The overnight stop was made at Bly.

which were carrying his words into the farthest corners of the country. Using frequent gestures, the president pictured the glory of America's growth, and when he declared America must continue to be "openly and candidly, intensely and scrupulously American" there came the first applause. After that the applause became more general. There was a roar when he declared for an adequate military force.

WASHINGTON, March 4.—March drew from her finest wares to provide a perfect dawn for inauguration day and President Coolidge was one of the first among all inaugural throngs to be out of doors in the bright morning sunlight.

Before 7:30 o'clock, while most of Washington was just bestirring itself from sleep, the president stepped out on the north portico of the mansion, took a round about around the northwest gate, past the stand where he later was to review his inaugural parade. The bright morning light was playing gladly on the red, white and blue that decked out the staid government buildings flanking the White House.

on each side and the freeze fast was losing its bite of yesterday.

Weather Is Good

To the secret service men who were his sole companions during the walk, the president remarked that on every one of the other eight days when he took an oath of office the weather had been at its best. He added that he hoped it would not break a precedent today.

Soon after he reentered the White House Mrs. Coolidge and their guests were ready for breakfast and the party sat down in the state dining room to the usual buckwheat cakes, Vermont maple syrup and sausage. Frank Stearns, the president's friend, was missing from the breakfast table, having gone to the union station to meet John Coolidge, an Amherst student, who came into Washington among the list of the inaugural crowds that had gathered to see his father become chief executive for another four years. Soon after 8 o'clock the first of the throngs that were to witness the taking of the oath on the capitol plaza had begun to make a thin fringe of humanity around the rear of the mammoth stands reserved for the elect.

Meantime the final decorations of the presidential stand, long garlands of evergreens, were put in place among the folds of the flags

that were draped everywhere about the post of honor. Then the radio announcers gave one last tryout to the broadcasting apparatus that was to carry the inaugural speech to the country and pronounced the arrangements perfect.

APPOINTMENT WILL BE ANNOUNCED SOON

Mr. Ganong is now well established at the government sanitarium, according to word received this morning. He will undergo treatment for lung trouble, which treatment will consist principally in living in the open and resting.
