Books Being Audited—

Disbursements, reimbursements, costs, checks, balances, credit and liability, are being conned over the county books by auditors from the firm of Robinson & Noel of San Francisco, certified public accountants, who are auditing the county books for the year 1924. The work is being conducted by Roland Rodolph and an assistant. Mr. Rodolph has done much accounting work in Klamath during the past several years, and is well known throughout the county.

Dispute Settled—

Title to a tract of 160 acres of land was given to Paul B. Burgund in a suit to quiet title which was brought against Harry Grimes et al. The decree quieting the title to the property was signed yesterday by Judge A. L. Leavitt.

Judgment Granted—

Judgment against W. C. North et al for the sum of \$1584, plus costs and attorneys fees, was granted to the World War Veterans Aid Commission yesterday by virtue of a decree handed down by Judge A. L. Leavitt yesterday. The costs amounted to \$47.85 and the attorneys fees \$150. The lien against North and his co-defendants was deemed a first and prior claim by the judge and the plaintiff was granted execution against the property involved.

Medford Attorney Visits—

F. J. Newman, prominent attorney of Medford, paid Klamath Falls a brief visit yesterday morning for the purpose of arguing a motion for reopening of the case of Benner vs. Hiltson. Following Mr. Newman's argument the case was reopened after a default judgment had been exercised. The Medford lawyer returned to his home yesterday afternoon.

Billy Bowdoin, Main street printer, is preparing to build a printing shop on his residence property on South Riverside. Mr. Bowdoin has been conducting his business in the Baldwin hotel.

ELECTRICITY BEATS COOKING DRUDGERY

SAN FRANCISCO, March 5.—More than 19,000 farmers' wives in California cook by electricity, according to figures compiled by the largest power distributing company in the state.

In the interior valleys, where wood, coal or oil is not readily available, cooking is done to a large extent by electricity.

The statistics indicate that there are in the state 167,504 rural light and power consumers, and they are served by 16,513 miles of distribution lines. Practically all the farms are lighted electrically.
