DAWES IN ROW WITH SENATORS

ing a natty brown business suit, he had stepped to his place on the dais just at noon, had called the senate to order by a single tap of the gavel and then had stepped aside without a word while the chaplain offered prayer. Then he waited calmly for the fire works to begin.

They started at once. The clerk started to read the journal of yesterday's proceedings and Senator Curtis, the republican leader, asked, as is customary, that the reading be dispensed with. Senators Reed and Hale demanded recognition.

"The senator from Maine," said Mr. Dawes. Senator Hale said certain criticism of the vice president had appeared in the morning newspapers because he had not returned to the senate chamber yesterday at the conclusion of the inaugural ceremonies.

"I think I can explain the reason he did not," said Senator Hale. "And I think it is my duty to do so."

Hale Explains "After the president had finished speaking the president and Mrs. Coolidge and the vice president and Mrs. Dawes went down the steps to the waiting autos. The president started off and the vice president then turned to me and said, 'I must return to the senate in order to preside over that body; how do I get there?' I replied he was not to return to the senate, but was to go to the reviewing stand in front of the White House to review the parade. This was due to a misunderstanding on my part and if any blame attaches it must rest upon me."

Senator Reed at once demanded that the journal be read but Senator Curtis wanted to go ahead with appointment of a committee to notify the president the new senate was in session and the Missouri finally agreed to an armistice until 2 o'clock.

But Senator Ashurst then demanded attention to explain that he had been misrepresented in this morning's newspapers as casting certain strictures on Mr. Dawes for his attack on the senate rules. He added that he had not criticized Mr. Dawes on that score but that he had objected to the "unseemly and unkindly interruption" by the vice president.

SWANSEN ELECTED PRESIDENT DURING BARBER'S MEETING

J. E. Swansen was elected president of the Klamath Falls Master Barbers' society of the Northwest Pacific during a meeting of that body last night. Other officers elected were Ray Crawford, vice president, and Arlet Edsall, secretary and treasurer.

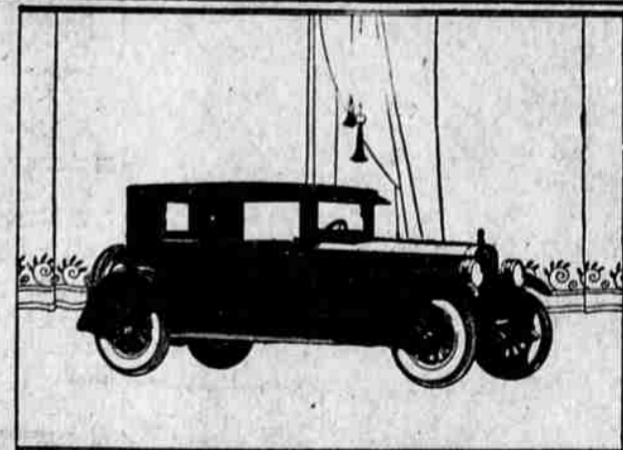
