EPIDEMICS ARE ON DECREASE, DOCTOR'S REPORT DISCLOSES

Light epidemics of scarlet fever and mumps characterized health conditions in Klamath county during the month of February according to the monthly report of Dr. G. S. Newton, county health officer.

Compared with the month of January, contagious diseases in Klamath during February show a slight decrease. There were 39 cases of contagious disease reported to the health office during the month of January while but 25 cases were reported during the month of Feb.

The epidemic of chicken pox which was fought by the health department last month has been checked and practically stamped out.

The following tabulation demonstrates clearly health conditions with relation to contagious diseases:
