WRITING TRACED BACK TO ZODIAC

LOS ANGELES, March 6.—A new ship was launched here recently on the seas of archaeology when Edward C. Gotsinger, astronomer and searcher of antiquities, in a paper presented by him before the Argonaut Club, a philosophical body meeting in the University of Southern California, outlined the principles of "zodiacalphy" whereby, he asserted, he was able to trace the origin of 20 written languages to the signs of the zodiac.

His findings, Mr. Gotsinger declared, proved that astronomy was a religious science familiar to the more intelligent classes of the ancient world upwards of 12,000 years ago; that the Bible, by means of zodiacalphy, now may be made to reveal many secrets, religious and historical, which hitherto have been locked books; that Israel has a history going back 6,500 years into a period when its high priests, as revealed by the mysteries of the heavens, were more advanced in some branches astronomy than the stargazers of today, and that there have been fundamental errors in the rendering by Egyptologists of some of the earliest inscriptions found in Egypt.

CIVILIZATION BEATS SOCRERY

CASS LAKE, Minn., March 7.—The passing of the "medicine man" with all of his supposedly supernatural powers over evil spirits, is enabling Minnesota Indians in increasingly large numbers to take advantage of the facilities for medical treatment at reservation hospitals, according to P. D. Wadsworth, superintendent of the Consolidated Chippewa Agency.

While most of the approximately 14,000 Chippewas in this state have become fairly civilized, hundreds of the more timid Indians are finding the gap between the old-fashioned tribal manners and the modern healing means difficult to bridge, said Mr. Wadsworth. Once the Indian overcomes his characteristic superstition, however, he makes an apt convert and readily subscribes to this praise of civilization's contribution to his welfare.

When the Indians become accustomed to patronizing "the white man's medicine man," as they term him, they make good customers. Old men of the tribe who have learned the advantages of such common treatments as the atomizer, or spray, for nose and throat infections, and iodine for external ailments, hasten to the infirmary at the least provocation.

BIG WAREHOUSE BURNED

Damage of \$30,000 Wrought by Fire on Tacoma Waterfront

TACOMA, Wash., March 7.—A fire that caused \$30,000 damage to the John B. Stevens company warehouse, threatened a large part of the waterfront here today. One fireman was injured fighting the flames, which were believed to be under control shortly before noon unless the blaze spreads beyond a fire wall now confining the fire. The warehouse was filled with hay and grain.

LIVESTOCK TAX HELD PUZZLER

Assessor Lee to Confer With Modoc Official to Determine Action

Knotty problems on "who is to tax who and why" are occupying the attention these days of Bill Lee, Klamath county assessor.

Proximity of California and the fact that there are no natural barriers between the two states that would keep Klamath livestock in Oregon and Modoc county livestock in California, have given rise to the usual problems as to the division of the tax spoils between the two counties.

Mr. Lee will meet with County Assessor Smith of Modoc county next week and come to some decision concerning assessment and taxation of livestock—both of Oregon and California—that moves back and forth from Modoc county to Klamath county during each year.

In some cases, the two assessors agree that the taxation should be split 50-50. Mr. Lee mentioned Mike Murphy's sheep as one example. Murphy has a contract with the United States government to range his sheep in Modoc county on national forest reserves during certain months of each year. When Murphy takes his sheep off the reserve he drives them back to his ranch, in Oregon. Some of the county assessors agree that Modoc county, California, should be given half the taxation of Murphy's sheep and Klamath the other half.

The two assessors will get together and list all the livestock of Modoc county and Klamath county, and tabulate the holdings of each.

WOODWARD FORFEITS \$500 BAIL; LIQUOR CASE STILL PENDS

By the failure of Samuel Woodward to appear in justice court yesterday afternoon for trial in justice court, the state prohibition fund was enriched by just \$500.

Woodward was arrested last Saturday night by R. E. Knowles and a pint of alleged moonshine was confiscated. He put up a bond of \$500 in cash and was released from custody.

Whether or not Woodward's failure to appear had something to do with a charge of driving while intoxicated which would have been filed against him eventually—according to the district attorney's office—is not known. Driving while drunk, is now a felony, following passage of a bill to that effect at the last session of the legislature. Conviction on the charge would bring a penalty of from one to three years in the state penitentiary.

Justice of the Peace R. E. Hunsaker decreed Woodward's bond to be forfeited yesterday afternoon.

BERLIN, March 7.—The majority party in the Reichstag has agreed to frame a measure appointing Dr. Walter Simons, president, ad interim of the German republic. Dr. Simons is a former foreign minister, and now president of the supreme court at Leipzig.

It is understood that the decision to make Dr. Simons the temporary president until a successor to the late President Ebert is elected, was primarily with the idea of leaving Dr. Hans Luther free to carry on his important work as Chancellor unhampered by the duties of the presidential office.
