## WILL CONTEST LARGE ESTATE

### Relatives of Aged Wealthy Recluse Involved in \$6,000,000 Case

CHICAGO, March 7.—An appeal from the decision of Probate Judge Horner, refusing to admit to probate what purported to be a will of the late Edwin B. Jennings, occurred.

recluse, who left a \$6,000,000 estate and no relatives nearer than cousins, was filed today. Scores of persons in many states have claimed to be related to the deceased but claims of only a few have been properly qualified.

The supposed will in a mutilated condition was mailed anonymously to the Northern Trust company, which turned it over to the court. The document, which was so mutilated and the signature of a witness virtually undecipherable that the court rejected it, purported to give two-thirds of the estate to educational purposes as a memorial to Jennings.
