### ANOTHER HEAVENLY BODY DISCOVERED

PASADENA, Calif., March 10.—Discovery that the variable star Mira, a faint speck in the sky 165 light years away in the constellation of Cetus, probably is the second largest known body in the universe, replacing the star Betelgeuse, which four years ago was hailed as the holder of that position, was announced yesterday at the Mount Wilson observatory.

According to the scientists, a study of Mira, which was named from the Latin word meaning wonderful, because of its great variation in light intensity, has revealed that star to be 250,000,000 miles in diameter and thus 25 per cent larger than Betelgeuse, the big star of the constellation Orion. The largest known heavenly body is Antares, 400,000,000 miles in diameter.

to his terminal site on Seventh street. We must eliminate personalities and consider what is just in the matter."

Here, West interposed a remark.

### No Personal Feeling

"I haven't noticed any personal feeling among the councilmen in regard to this question, have you?"

"Well yes," Roberts replied, "some times I thought I have seen personal feelings showing."

Councilmen Balsiger and Cofer favored quick action of some kind.

"I do feel that the railroad company should have an open mind in regard to the question," Mr. Balsiger said.

Outcome of the Strahorn matter, was that the council would meet, probably this week, and attempt to come to some decision.

### Didn't Collect Fees

When a number of applications for permits to operate rooming houses and hotels were read, it developed that City Recorder Lem L. Gaghagen had not exacted the regular fee of \$1 from each hotel in other permits granted. The council suggested that in the future that fee be taken and that arrangements be consummated to collect all back fees.

Two emergency ordinances, one giving the Klamath News the city printing contract and the other awarding the firm of Robert and Knoll the contract for auditing the city books for 1924, were passed by the council. The city printing contract was awarded over the mayor's veto of last session.

### Street Improvements Discussed

Usual discussion of street improvements took up a large part of the council's time.

With a proposition more favorable to the city, W. E. Young, connected with Linton Transit company and the Astoria transit company, appeared before the council last night to ask for a 20 year bus line franchise. The council stated that in the near future something concrete would be done on the matter.

### AUSTRIA CHIDED BY LEAGUE HEADS

GENEVA, March 10.—Austria came in for another chiding today by the council of the league of nations. Her failure to carry out various features of the league's final reconstruction plan was re-proved.

The financial committee reported that the Austrian budget for 1925 and various bills necessary to effect several fiscal reforms had not been adopted by the parliament. Furthermore, the general administration appointments recommended had not been brought about while the central bank of issue had not centralized its receipts and expenditures. Austin Chamberlain, British foreign secretary presiding, diplomatically warned Austria of the urgent necessity of fulfilling all the league's requirements. A general debate followed.

The council passed a resolution approving the opinion and recommendations of the final commission and attacking the highest importance to the prompt execution by Austria of these recommendations.
