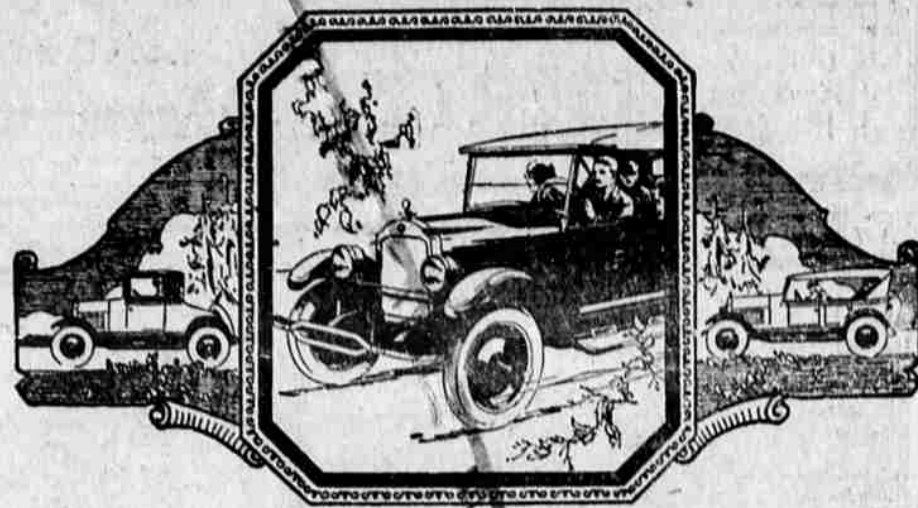

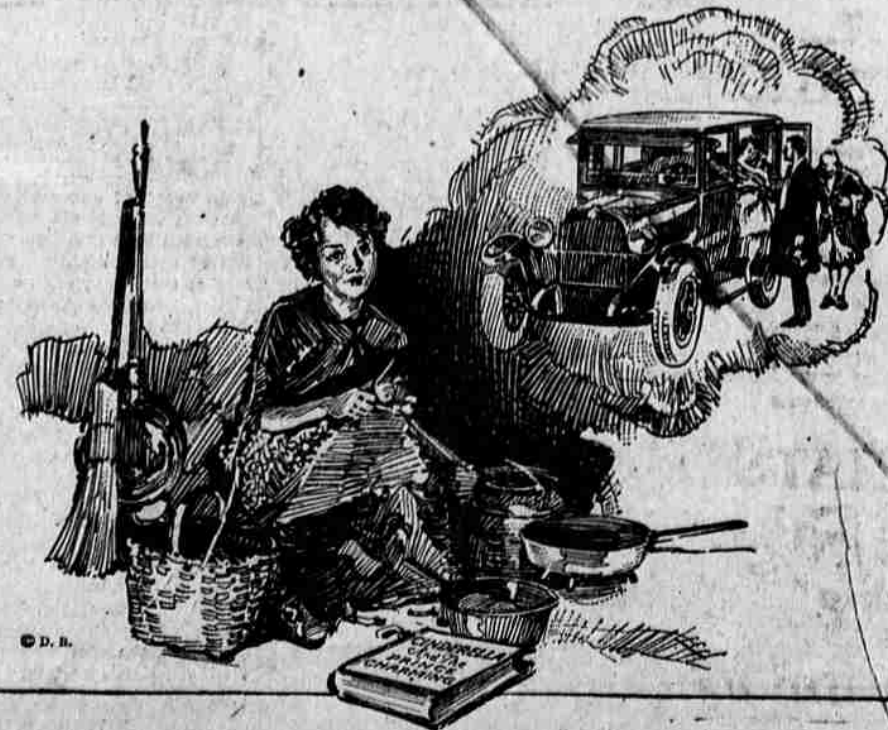

### MINNESOTA WILL HONOR PIONEERS

HAMLIN, Minn., March 10.—When Norwegians from all parts of the world come here for all Norway-American Centennial, they will see the story of the little sloop "Restauranten" depicted in pageant. She was a vessel of 45 tons, manned by 53 Norwegians who left their fatherland 100 years ago this year to seek fortune in America.

The centennial is planned to commemorate the events of this first migration and to eulogize the Norwegian pioneers in America. Officials in charge are negotiating to make Norway's participation in the affair of an official nature, which would mean that Crown Prince Olaf would represent his country at the exposition.

### Mrs. Leslie Congo Found Guilty of Bootlegging

It took a jury at Bonanza less than half an hour yesterday to return a verdict of guilty against Mrs. Leslie Congo, charged with violation of the liquor laws. She was fined \$250 by Justice of the Peace J. O. Hamaker. She paid the fine. Her husband recently was fined \$500 and sentenced to six months in jail for the same offense, while Tom Wilson, said to be an employe of Congo in his reputed bootlegging operations, was found guilty and fined \$250.
