INCORPORATED

Articles Of Community Hall Filed With County Clerk

Articles of incorporation for the Merrill community hall at Merrill were filed yesterday with the county clerk by George W. Otfield, R. H. Anderson, Fred Stukel, C. P. Haskins and M. L. Moore, all well known citizens of the Merrill community. The articles set forth that the community hall is to be used for community purposes and for the use of public entertainments, athletic games, dances and the like. The capital stock was quoted at \$7500 with 750 shares at \$10 a share.

KNOLL HEARING PUT OFF

Lack Of Attorney Causes Postponement Of Larceny Case

When G. Knoll charged with stealing clothes from a house, came up before Justice of the Peace R. E. Hansaker yesterday afternoon for a preliminary hearing, it appeared that the defendant had no attorney to present his case but did have a host of witnesses on hand to testify on his behalf.

The magistrate concluded that more time should be allowed Knoll to procure an attorney and postponed the case till tomorrow morning at 10 a. m. The formal charge against Knoll is larceny in a dwelling. He is made a defendant in a circuit court action, filed today, charging that he owes George Poulos \$152.55 for certain chattels taken unlawfully, plus costs and disbursements of the action.

NO CHICKEN POX FOUND

County Health Nurse Runs Down Rumor Of Epidemic

A report that there were several cases of Chicken pox in the vicinity of Malin, was the incentive yesterday of a trip to that territory by Miss Lydia Fricke, county health nurse, to investigate the report. Miss Fricke's findings were that if there was any chicken pox in the territory that the cases are now cured and that there is no evidence of an epidemic. While in the southern part of the county, Miss Fricke took the opportunity to call on Dr. J. D. Cleaveland of Merrill and to confer with the Merrill physician on county health matters. Roads between Klamath Falls and Merrill are in excellent condition considering the time of year and the bad weather, Miss Fricke said.

PARTITION BUILT

New Irrigation District Office To Be Ready Within 10 Days

Construction of a partition separating the furnace room in the basement of the court house from the space given to the Klamath Irrigation district by the county court, has been completed. Secretary A. M. Thomas of the district hopes to be able to move into the new quarters in the court house within a week or ten days. The new office will be a decided improvement over the one now used, both as to available facilities and location.
