NEW YORK, March 11.—Johannes Bartholemewsky, 12, of Los Angeles, Calif., has been awarded the boy scout medal for heroism today at national headquarters. Bartholemewsky and another youth were building a trail across the face of a cliff when the second boy fell over the edge. He clutched a small shrub and held on until Bartholemewsky rescued him by suspending himself from a small tree.

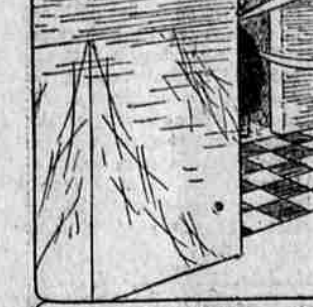

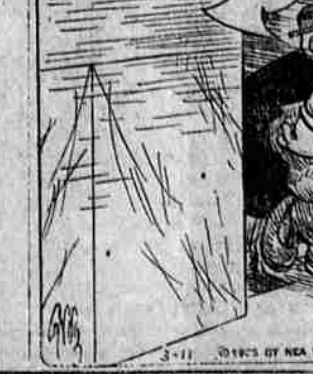
