TWO CONTRACTS WILL BE DRAWN

Reclamation Service and Attorney for Irrigation District Fix Plan

Compromise will be the medium through which the government and the water users of the Klamath Irrigation project will come to an agreement on the Maintenance and Operation contract, it was learned today.

Following a conference last week between J. R. Coffey and H. L. Holgate, two legal representatives of the reclamation bureau, with the board of directors of the irrigation district, it was decided that two tentative contracts should be drawn up. One contract would be drawn by J. H. Carnahan, attorney for the district and representing the water users and the second by Mr. Coffey, representing the government. When Mr. Carnahan finishes his contract he will submit it to Mr. Coffey. The reclamation attorney when he has completed his tentative contract will submit it to the board of directors of the Klamath project.

Through mutual constructive criticism, it is hoped that a contract satisfactory to both the government and water users will be drawn up, from the tentative contracts. The proposition of whether or not the water users of the district desire to maintain and operate the Klamath Irrigation district in order to take advantage of relief measures as recommended by the fact finding committee, will be decided some time this year when the matter will be referred to the water users for final decision.

In event the water users approve the Maintenance and Operation contract, the work of the local bureau of reclamation will be cut down to future construction work.

ELECTRIC DEALERS STAGE CONFERENCE

A meeting of the electrical contractor-dealers and power company representatives from all parts of Southern Oregon and Northern California, was held in Medford, Friday, March 6th. The program started off with a business meeting at the Copco Home Office Building, during which time a general discussion was held on the subject of "Electric Ranges" and other trade topics of interest. A number of interesting talks were heard concerning the ever-increasing popularity of the electric range throughout this section, some important facts and figures being revealed in this connection.

It was stated by a representative of the California Oregon Power company, that one out of every six and a half electric customers on the Copco system was an electric range user. This general use of electricity in the home is made possible by the reasonable rate for cooking and lighting combined which is offered to the customers served by the Copco system.

The business meet was followed by a dinner at the Hotel Medford, which was interspersed by several good talks on topics of general interest to the electrical industry. The entire program was a big success and it was decided to hold similar meetings at periodic intervals in the future.
